WELL PLANNED JAIL BREAK FRUSTRATED

Sheriff H. T. McClallen's Alertness Only Prevented the Escape of Four Prisoners

A bold and well planned jail break was frustrated by Sheriff H. T. McClallen this morning. Upon his return from a visit north this morning he soon proceeded to the county jail whereupon one prisoner was found missing. He lined the others up and commenced questioning them when the missing lad came forth from between the steel cage and the wall where he had been diligently working since Saturday evening in an endeavor to cut a hole through the cement and brick wall. With an excuse to get some wood, the two lads held for stealing a watch were permitted by Deputy Bogard to go into the corridor Saturday evening and upon returning one of them stepped into the narrow passage between the cage and brick wall unobserved. A search revealed the fact that he had within his possession a flat piece of iron 12 inches long and one inch wide; a case knife nicked like a saw and a small saw made from a spring from a sole of a shoe. It was anticipated by the four culprits in the jail that a break might be effected tonight, J. E. Barnes, the Glendale alleged murderer having plotted the break. The plot was discovered more so soon and now Sheriff McClallen is trying to figure out how the articles found on the youthful criminal came into the lad's possession. Besides Barnes, accused of murder, two transient lads, Frank Reed and Jas. Thompson, are awaiting trial on the charge of the larceny of a watch, the fourth prisoner and the one who was drilling the hole in the wall, "Bones" Baker, being held on the charge of assisting the two lads to escape from the city jail recently. The alertness of Sheriff McClallen only prevented a cleverly planned jail break.

LABEL SUIT KNOCKED OUT

Representative Burns Loses his \$15,000 Label Suit Against R. D. Hume.

Salem, Or., July 15.—In the label suit of Representative Burns of Curry county against R. D. Hume, Judge Burnett this afternoon instructed the jury to bring a verdict for the defendant. This case was the outcome of Hume's action in distributing in the Oregon legislature during the last session printed circulars denouncing Burns in strong language because he opposed a bill giving Hume exclusive fishing rights on Rogge River. This was generally considered a strong case for the plaintiff, Mr. Burns, as the language of the Hume circular was decidedly strong and of a rather vile nature, however the case occupied but little time in court, the Judge holding there was no grounds for the damages asked for by Mr. Burns, and that no libel had been committed. It is understood that the Gibson label suit for \$3,000 against the Salem Journal resulted in a victory for that paper.

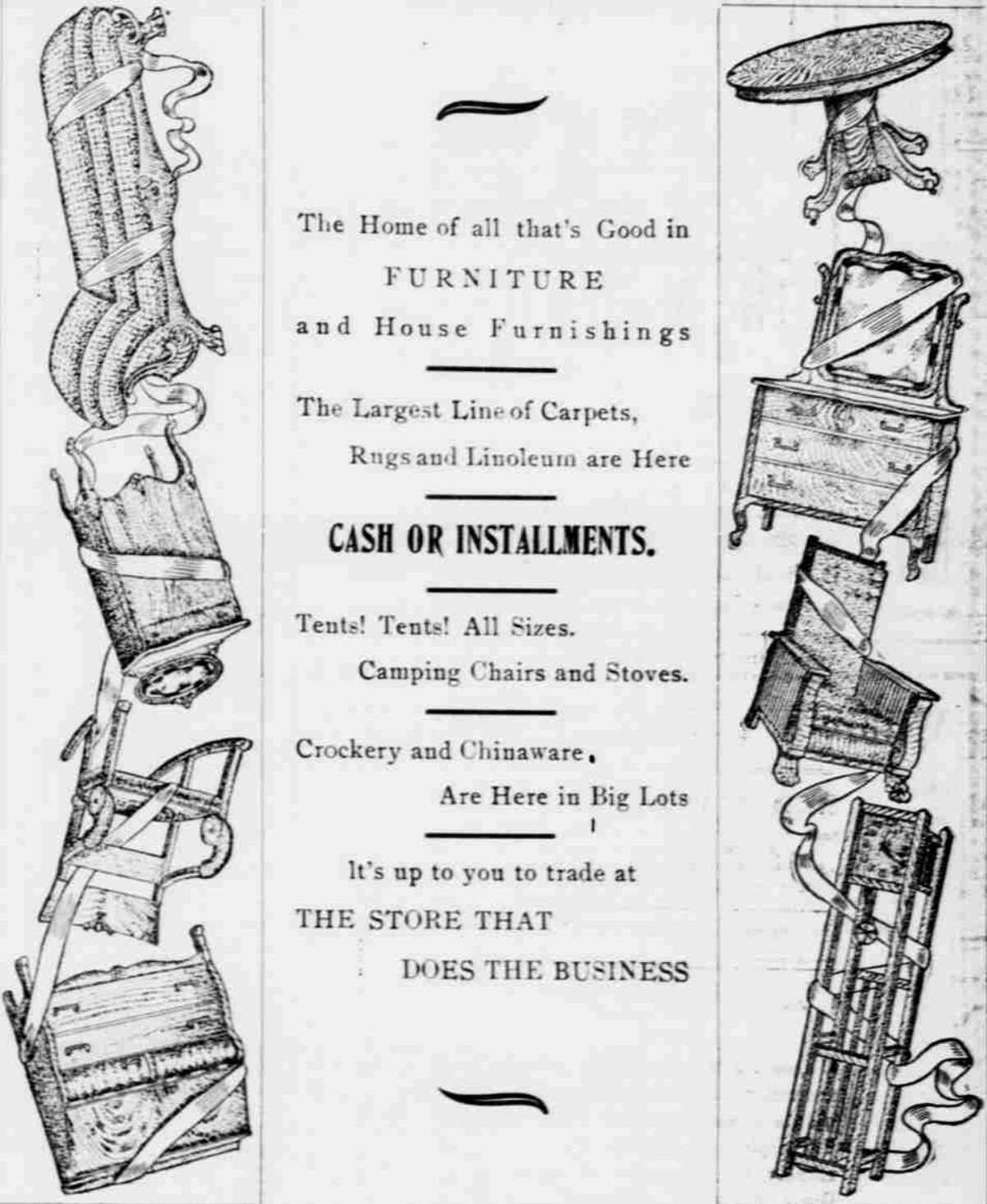
