RIFLE TEAM IS SELECTED

The riflemen to constitute the state team to compete at the national shoot at Seagirt, N. J., was announced as follows at Camp Finzer today:

These and five other men have been in practice on the Range at Camp Finzer since last Thursday but the five who have failed to make good in being selected to represent Oregon at the eastern shoot will be immediately returned to their homes.

During the practice the men have shot all over ranges from 200 to 1000 yards and the 800 yard skirish run. In the latter which was made last Sunday morning and which closed the competition, Capt. Hamlin of this city made the remarkable score of 90 out of a possible 100 points. The targets shot at are two in number and represent the figures of a man one kneeling and one lying down as if shooting. The contestants are allowed 20 shots at distances ranging from 600 to 200 yards. Ten of Capt. Hamlin's shots took effect in the kneeling figure and 10 in the prone, each shot counting 4 and 5 points respectively.

While shooting at the 800 yard target Friday, Corporal McLachlin of Co. L, of LaGrande, made eight straight bull's eye. In the first days shoot at distances 800 and 600 yards, Sergeant Stewart of Co. D, of Roseburg led the score, since that time Sergeant Weldon of Portland has been leading with Rider and White both of Salem close seconds up to Sunday morning. Shooting at all ranges the possible would be 575 points and the scores of the men were as follows:

The same committee was continued to dispose of the stock of goods. The league will perfect its organization and will continue. The merchants are pleased with the results secured and will make the league a valuable organization. Similar action has been taken by the Eugene merchants and the newspapers are denouncing the scheme everywhere. The scheme has been quickly imposed upon a number of Roseburg merchants who are now endeavoring through the city council or otherwise to shake off the graft.
