Swam to Safety

Expert Life Saver Dived Into River to Escape Arrest.

Then He Kept Swimming Under the Water Until Out of Sight of His Pursuer—His Record.

One afternoon not long ago a New York policeman named Martin Schroeder of the Yorkville court squad saw a man named Frank Carroll at work in a lumber yard. Carroll saw the po-



lice man at the same moment and, dropping his tools, ran in the direction of the East river. "Stop that man!" cried Schroeder, racing after Carroll. "I have a warrant for his arrest."

The crowd did not heed the policeman's order, but joined in the chase. Carroll was not as lively on his feet as the policeman and was nearly overtaken when he reached a pier. He dived headlong into the river.

Schroeder, panting and the sweat running down his face, seeing that he had missed his man by a narrow margin, waited patiently for Carroll to come to the surface. One minute passed and Carroll did not appear. "Get a row boat, quick!" shouted the policeman. "He'll be caught in the current."

The crowd watched with the policeman and after a wait of thirty minutes Schroeder gave up the job and told the excited crowd that his man had chosen a watery grave in preference to a cell.

"Poor man," said Schroeder, "to die like a rat in this river, and all on account of a warrant for a trifling offense. I pity his wife and children."

Then the policeman called up police headquarters and told the story of the escape and how his man had probably drowned.

A reporter learned a much different story at the home of Carroll. His wife said that he was not drowned, but had made a clever escape from the policeman by swimming under water for nearly two blocks. Carroll is a life saver of reputation and claims to have rescued thirty-two persons from drowning.

"My husband has a gold medal and several silver ones from J. Wesley Jones and the Volunteer Life Saving association for bravery," said Mrs. Carroll. "He is the champion swimmer of the ward and can easily stay under water for an eighth of a mile with his clothes on. My Frank drowned—not on your life!"

Carroll remained under water for nearly five minutes, he told his wife. His wife then prevented him from making speed, but he reached a pier at a distance from that where his pursuer was, safely and out of breath. He went home almost exhausted. A change of clothing and a cup of hot coffee made him feel like a new man. His wife then cooked his dinner, and one hour after his escape from the policeman he was back at his job handling lumber.

Carroll, who is thirty-eight years old, is one of the best known characters in the Gas House section of New York. His career as a life saver began twenty years ago, and he has made a rescue each year since. He has several children.

It was said at the police station that the warrant for his arrest was an old one for non-support, obtained by his wife. Mrs. Carroll said she did not ask for the warrant.

"They may catch Frank Carroll on land," said his wife, "but the police will have to hire a couple of submarine boats if he once gets into the water."
