### Death of Two Prominent Citizens

Mrs. Mary C. Parrott, wife of L. M. Parrott, died at her home in North Roseburg Aug. 16, 1905, after an illness of several months. Spinal meningitis was the cause of her death. Mrs. Parrott was 61 years of age. She has been in poor health all summer, but not until Friday was her case considered as critical. From that day she steadily declined until the end.

Mrs. Parrott had been a resident of Roseburg for 17 years. She was a most estimable lady, a devoted Christian and enjoyed the esteem of the entire community, to whom her death came as a painful intelligence.

Surviving Mrs. Parrott is her husband and four children: Mrs. Ethel Carlyle of this city; J. W. Parrott of Geyersville, Calif.; and Mrs. N. N. Chapman and Miss Eudora Parrott of Colorado; also one brother, J. J. Bellis of Missouri, and two sisters, Mrs. M. Leek of Missouri, and Mrs. S. Woodruff of Santa Fe, N. M.

The funeral was held Thursday (yesterday) at 2:30 o'clock from the Presbyterian church in this city, of which Mrs. Parrott was a member. Services were conducted by Revs. J. A. Townsend and E. H. Hicks, interment in the Masonic cemetery.

### Death of G. R. Linsler.

G. R. Linsler, a resident of Roseburg for the past twelve years, during ten of which he was engaged in business, and a veteran of the Civil War, died at his home here Wednesday morning, August 16, 1905, at the age of 57 years. Death came as a result of several strokes of paralysis which Mr. Linsler has suffered during the past few months. The last and most severe stroke occurred Thursday morning, paralyzing Mr. Linsler's right side and rendering him entirely helpless. From that day on he failed rapidly until his peaceful death.

Mr. Linsler was a native of Germany. When seven years of age he came to the United States with his parents. At the outbreak of the Civil War, when still in his teens, he enlisted in the Federal Navy. He was a member of the crew of the famous frigate "Hartford," Admiral Farragut's flagship, at the battle of Mobile Bay. Several years after the close of the war, Mr. Linsler located in South Dakota. In 1892 he moved to Portland, Oregon, and a year later removed to this city and engaged in business, continuing therein until two years ago, when he was obliged to retire on account of ill health.

Mr. Linsler was a member of Roseburg Lodge No. 328, B. P. O. Elks. He was an exemplary citizen and had many friends, who will be grieved to learn of his demise.

Mr. Linsler is survived by his wife and four children: Mrs. J. H. Sykes and Harry Linsler of this city; Miss Hattie Linsler of Portland, who has been in attendance at her father's bedside for several weeks past, and Miss Emma Linsler of Carpinteria, Calif. He also leaves two sisters and a brother in New York.

Mr. Linsler's aged mother died here only a few months ago.

The funeral was held from the family home this morning at 11 o'clock, under the auspices of the Elks' lodge, services being conducted by Rev. E. H. Hicks, in interment in the Odd Fellows' cemetery.

### In the Circuit Court.

Suits against Thos. C. Bloomer, proprietor of the Hotel McClallen, have been filed in the circuit court here aggregating over \$1700, and the lease of the Hotel McClallen held by Mr. Bloomer has been attached by both the Douglas County Bank and H. Marks & Co. of this city.

John R. Sutherland, former owner, has filed a suit against Mr. Bloomer, to foreclose a mortgage on the entire hotel equipment in order to satisfy a promissory note for \$5000, on which Mr. Sutherland alleges only \$2785.14 has been paid. The note was executed by Mr. Bloomer in Mr. Sutherland's favor on March 31, 1904. According to Mr. Sutherland's complaint, the note was to be paid in regular monthly installments of \$300 with interest, but that after Feb. 18, 1905, the defendant ceased making payments.

Chan Hi, Mr. Bloomer's celestial chef has sued for back salary, for himself and assistant, amounting to \$1355., he having conducted the cooking department of the hotel for the past 16 1/2 months and has only received \$1.85.

H. Marks & Co. suits for money due on a promissory note issued April 22, 1905, for \$892.85, only \$219.20 having been paid on same. Between May 10 and May 30, the complaint alleges that Mr. Bloomer purchased goods, wares and merchandise to the value of \$1929.10 upon which \$68.76, being two and a half months' board, has been paid. Marks & Co. ask for judgment for \$181.75 and \$75 attorney fees.

The Douglas County Bank suits for \$300, with interest, from July 8, 1905 at 8 per cent and 40 attorney fees, alleged to be due on a promissory note of \$400, upon which \$100, and \$21.35, interest, has been paid. Attorneys Cardwell and Watson appear for the plaintiff in all cases.

From the suits filed one would naturally believe that the Hotel McClallen was a piece of bad property or had been poorly managed, but such is not the case. We are informed by parties who are in a position to know that the Hotel McClallen has been making good money, but that the profits and receipts of this hotel have been used to square accounts against the Hotel Revere at Albany, the other property of Mr. Bloomer. The management of the Hotel McClallen has been first class and there is no complaint against it either by the traveling public or the local people.

Mr. Westbrook, manager of the hotel under Mr. Bloomer, has been placed in full charge of the house since the papers of attachment have been served.

Mr. Bloomer is not in this city but will arrive here from Albany tonight, we understand, and it is probable that he will take immediate steps to settle all accounts.

Chas. H. Bailey vs Nellie Bailey, suit for divorce. Parties were married in Curry County March 22, 1890. Complaint alleges that Mrs. Bailey deserted her husband leaving the state. Attorneys J. C. Fullerton and J. Huntly appear for the plaintiff.
