*National League Official Says He Feels Lonely When Some One Isn't Calling Him Names. Doesn't Notice Stray Bolls Any More.*

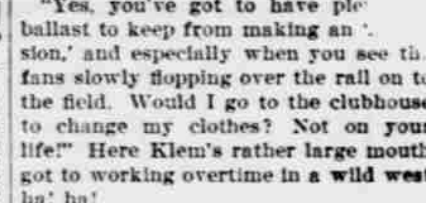
The writer recently had a talk with W. J. Klem, the well known National League umpire, after a particularly trying day in St. Louis.

"Mr. Klem, I said, 'the public would like to hear the umpire's story—that is, his side of the case. We have heard from the fans and the players. Now we would like to hear from you.'"

He thought a long while. "Why, I didn't know the umpire had a side in the case," he said, with a laugh. "It's a real lonesome if I didn't hear some fan holler 'Dub! Robber! Thief! Lobster' and a few other things besides."

"But that don't bother me. All I see when I'm on the ball field is the game, the ball players and the ball. The roar of bleachers is natural to my ears. I don't even notice stray beer glasses or bottles nowadays. No, that's right. Why, very frequently I couldn't tell who is at the bat. I know he is on the team, that's all. I just look at the ball and know that's that's enough to keep me busy. Yes, I know lots of people in the grand stand and bleachers umpire the game differently from the way I do."

He was game, however, and took care to give one of the fellows a good ducking along with him."
