Obituary
Eliza J. Evans was born in the city of New York, March 31, 1823. She was confirmed in, and joined the Episcopal church when young, and throughout a long life was true to its religious teachings. In 1844 at Independence, Mo., she was united in marriage to George Hannan, and the fruit of the union was nine children, of which five survive. In the same year they were married. Mr. and Mrs. Hannan moved to Oregon City, where they resided until 1852 when they came to Douglas County where Mr. Hannan died in 1875.
Fifty years ago churches were few in number and there being no organization of her denomination, Mrs. Hannan united with the Methodist church remaining a member until her death. Before her death she gave assurance that she was ready to meet her Lord in peace, departing this life in Lewiston, Idaho, Aug. 19, 1905, having attained the age of 82 years 4 months and 19 days. Five children, 16 grand-children one grandchild a niece and a circle of friends mourn her departure.
Interment took place at Wilbur, Aug. 22, 1905, Rev. Hunter conducting the service.
