WHAT IS GOING ON AT THE COURTHOUSE

Items Which Will be of Interest to the Taxpayers

Up to date 850 hunter license have been issued in this county.

The petition for the Razor-Riddle road was denied on account of the remoteness being greater than the petition.

Several road cases were argued and continued until next term of court. Among them were the Red Hill or Chivigny road, the Riddle road and the Hall Creek road.

The bill of W. G. Hughes for \$200 presented at the January term of court, for the loss of a horse, at Lone Rock Ferry last December, was considered by the court and allowed Mr. Hughes \$100.

Assessor Geo. Staley and County Clerk Age returned Sunday from a few days visit at the fair. They say that the Douglas county exhibit is in fine condition and attracting much attention.

The county court for Douglas county closed its term of court Thursday evening, being in session but two days. The most important items to come before the court were the numerous bills which were audited and allowed.

Sheriff McClallen is one of the most busy county officials and surely does the most traveling on official business. This morning he returned from Portland where he has been spending several days combining business with pleasure, and left immediately for Glendale on business.

P. A. Wilson, one of Riddle's estimable citizens has been before the county commissioners in behalf of some important road matters. For some time past, he and others of his neighborhood have been endeavoring to have the county road in that section taken from off the bar and moved back into a better location. He informs the Plaine dealer that they are now very hopeful of carrying out their long-cherished plans.

James Inman, the prominent Looking Glass farmer and Independent Presidential candidate, whose picture and sketch appear in this issue, was in this city on business this week. He informs us that he has been notified by County Clerk Age, that the papers in his \$10,000 damage suit have not been properly filed. Mr. Inman says that he will immediately take steps to correct the errors and the suit will come up at the next term of the circuit court. Some months ago Mr. Inman was thrown from a load of hay on account of the bad condition of the road over which he was driving and his hand and arm was injured so that at present they are almost useless and on that account he is using Douglas county.

Railroad News

Engineer P. E. Prettyman has been confined to his bed with a severe attack of tonsillitis.

T. P. Lee, the watermelon man, passed through this city Friday with a carload of melons for Portland. His liberality with the railroad boys assures him of a wide circle of friends among them.

A fire was discovered in the S. P. Co's. sand dry house near the roundhouse in the yards here Saturday morning. To yard engine was called and soon had a stream of water playing onto the flame which were quickly extinguished with but slight damage to the building.

Thos. Ryan, the well known Equitable Life Insurance Stockholder, who has been making a tour through Oregon in his private car, "Pierre Marquette," which was derailed just this side of Myrtle Creek Wednesday morning, which was left at the place of derailment until a wrecker reached there from this station and then brought to this city, is a most pleasant and genial fellow, at least that is what the employees of the road who replaced the car on the track and repaired the damages say. Mr. Frank Cavan'ar who is in charge of the repair work says Mr. Ryan passed out the cigars to the workmen and was pleasant and interesting to the men. The cause of the derailment was partially in fault of the track and partly in fault of the front wheels of Mr. Ryan's private car, both being out of gauge.

The "Pierre Marquette" was the last car on the north bound local Wednesday morning, and after leaving Myrtle Creek, parties riding in the car discovered that the front trucks had left the track and immediately pulled the signal cord to stop, but owing to the derailment the signal pipe was twisted and out of order, and the signal did not reach the engine properly. The car was dragged about 1500 feet before the train was stopped.

The condition of the car was such that it was impossible to bring it into this city, and after considerable delay the car was left and the local arrived here about two hours late.

Assistant Superintendent Taylor was at the station and accompanied the wrecker crew to the scene of the trouble where the car was repaired, placed on the track and brought to this city, and here other needed repairs were finished and Mr. Ryan proceeded north, declaring that should he ever have an accident again he was in hopes it would be upon this division.
