He brought some beautiful copper specimens from the "Riverside" mine. The "Broad way" owned by the Oregon Security Co. and first discovered by Mr. Anderson, has just made a remarkable "strike," which is exciting much talk. The ore brought in by him runs \$40 to the ton and there is lots of it in sight. The mines are located at the headwaters of the Steamboat branch of the North Umpqua river. **CITY ELECTION**

**COMING ON APACE**

The City election which is to be held Monday, October 9, is not far away and already there are indications which indicate that it may become rather interesting ere many days have passed.

For the important office of Mayor there are two avowed candidates thus far heard from, with others to come to the front. Many citizens have been urging Atty. G. W. Kimball to let his name be used for the place. Mr. Kimball is in no sense of the word seeking the office and it is only after being asked by many representative citizens that he will enter the race. Said one prominent citizen, in speaking of Kimball's candidacy: "He is just the man for the place. He is modest and unassuming. He does not push himself forward, but it is at the request of his friends that he allows his name to be used. Mr. Kimball has been a heavy taxpayer in this city and he would always be found advocating measures which would be for the best interests of this city. To me he seems to be the very man for the place."

Dr. E. V. Hoover who is at present filling this important place has been requested to again serve the people in this difficult and trying place. After careful consideration he has agreed to again try for the place. I am not pushing myself to the front in this matter," said he to the reporter, "but my friends see in me a man who I have filled the office in a manner satisfactory to the masses and I am willing to serve them again in this capacity, providing they decide that they want me." I will favor any reform or anything that is for the best interests of the people."

Mirell, whose name had been mentioned in connection with the majority race and, among other things that gentleman said: "I am not in the race and never have been. I would not have it if I could get it. I have no desire to get the honor and, further, I would not accept it if it were offered me."

**COW CREEK MINES**

**MAKE GOOD SHOWING**

This week J. M. Thompson placed on exhibition in the Plaindealer show windows some fine-looking specimens of ore from his mine on the West Fork of Cow Creek. That comparatively new mining district and it is coming rapidly into notice as giving great promise. These samples are from ore which has been assayed four different times on the exhibition at the fair grounds.

Mr. Thompson has gone in about 16 feet and the showing becomes better right along. He is now driving a tunnel. In that same region there are several other apparently good mines and much development work will be done in that immediate vicinity. One claim owned by Porter and Dick has been bounded to an experienced Colorado miner for \$20,000. "The Eagle" mine, owned by Henry Martindale is another property which is showing up nicely. A 250 foot tunnel has just been completed and splendid ore is being found in it.

At present the camp is reached only by a trail, but, in case the mine bounded by Hinman shows up as it is expected to do, a good wagon road will be built to connect with the S. P. at West Fork.

Another good property is owned by Art Ohman. It has a ledge which is attracting considerable attention. Frank Skinner, of Portland, is putting in a ditch to work his placer claim.
