Funeral services were conducted by Rev. Geo. C. Ritley at the Christian church this afternoon. Interment was made in the L. O. O. F. cemetery.

PUBLIC SCHOOLS DOING NICELY

The fall term of the Roseburg public schools opened up Monday morning the opening having been postponed one week on account of the fact that the District Fair was in session in this city last week and many scholars could not start in until after that was over.

Superintendent A. M. Sanders is one of the busiest people one could hope to find anywhere. He has under his immediate supervision both the high and the grammar schools and those who are in a position to speak say that he is doing the work of two or three men in getting things to start off nicely. In addition to being in charge of the entire school system of the city, he also teaches Latin and German in the high school course.

"We think we have one of the finest corps of teachers to be found anywhere," remarked Superintendent Sanders in the hearing of the Plaindealer man, but not especially for publication. "Yes," continued he, "I am sure that none of the schools in Oregon can outclass us and I have my doubts if they can begin to compare with us. Some of our force are exceptionally strong, and, as a whole I think that we are very fortunate in having procured such good instructors."

This year the attendance will probably exceed that of last year quite a bit. Nearly seven hundred have already enrolled and by the end of the week there will be all of seven hundred on the rolls, although there should be even more than that, for there are over one thousand children of school age in this district. Of the number now enrolled, seventy are in the high school. Roseburg, by the way, has the only high school in Douglas county which has more than ten grades and this results in several pupils coming in from the outlying districts to get the benefit of this full course. Of course they have to pay a light tax as required by law.

Roseburg has newly equipped buildings and now, with an excellent set of teachers there will eventually be some splendid work done.

The compulsory school law will make some difference in the general average, if it does not tend to increase the enrollment, think the officials. There are twenty teachers employed in the different departments and they are all going to pride themselves upon having fine records to show at the close of the school year.

Soon the regular weekly teacher's meetings will begin and also the PTA-district society will be organized by the high school pupils, and then there will be class organizations, parties, receptions and such things to enliven the social phase of the school year.
