Died.
LEWIS—At the family residence on
Messer street in this city at 10 o'clock
Sunday evening, Oct. 1, 1905, of pa-
ralysis, Morton Lafayette Lewis, aged
75 years, six months and 19 days.

Morton Lafayette Lewis was born in
Clay county, Illinois, March 12, 1830,
and crossed the plains in 1853 settling in
Yreka, Calif., where he engaged in min-
ing. In 1858 Mr. Lewis moved to Doug-
las county, Ore., and took up a home-
stead in Olalla valley and engaged in
farming and stock raising. On May 17,
1859, he married Mary Francis Richards
at Ten Mile and thereafter resided at
Olalla until 1880 when he moved his
family to Roseburg and engaged in gen-
eral teaming and freighting business until
1884 when he suffered a stroke of pa-
ralysis which caused the loss of the use
of the entire left side of his body and
ever since that time he has been almost
helpless, remaining in that condition
almost continually until Sept. 22, when
he suffered a second stroke effecting his
entire body which caused his death at
10:00 o'clock Sunday evening.

Mr. Lewis has through all his suffer-
ing borne it with patience and hardly
ever complained of his unfortunate con-
dition. He was a faithful worker for
his family's welfare, a patient and lov-
ing father and husband.

Besides his wife, there remains to
survive his two sons, Crawford
Lewis and Lawrence Lafayette
Lewis, two daughters, Susan Francis
Lewis and Mrs. Sallie Cannon, and one
granddaughter, Velma Lewis, daughter
of C. P. Lewis, all of this city, and all at
the bedside at the time of the death.

The funeral service will be held from
the residence of his son, C. P. Lewis, on
Tues. street, Tuesday afternoon at 2
o'clock. Services will be conducted by
Rev. C. H. Lake, of the Episcopal
Church, Interment in the Masonic
cemetery.
