ROSEBURG VANQUISHES THE DRAIN NORMAL
An Interesting and Snappy Contest
--Orange and Black got the Better of Red and White
The first football game of the season was held at Roseburg Saturday afternoon. The weather was ideal and a large crowd assembled to see the plucky lads from the high school meet their heavier opponents from Drain. The high school lads were out in a body to root for their Eleven which they have so much confidence in.
The remainder of the crowd was about evenly divided in sympathy between the visitors and the locals. Every good play brought cheers from the sympathizers, and these cheers were frequent for the game was full of sensation. While the Roseburg Eleven was making progress with the ball the happy smiles on the faces of the local girls were enough to win over the most ardent women haters, but while the locals were getting drilled by their opponents these happy faces changed to most any stage from intense anger to a vinegar sour. Happy for us that the Roseburg lads won or else we might have lost the memory of our high school girls.
The game was called promptly at 2:30. Captain Moon won the toss-up and chose the east side. Captain Gagnon took the kick-off. Hanan kicked for 50 yards and rain advanced the ball 5 yards. Whipple advanced the ball 2 yards, Moon 3 yards. Then Finnerty took the ball around end for 25 yards and was making great progress toward the coveted goal when he was crowded to the sidelines and downed by Easton. Then the Roseburg boys took a brace and from that time to the end of the half it was nobody's game. Punting, end runs and line bucks were resorted to, but still the ball remained the most of the time in Drain's territory and at a safe distance from the goal. When time was called for the first half, Drain had the ball on their own 45 yard line.
In the second half Drain kicked to Ragsdale, who advanced the ball 8 yards. Then the high school lads showed their could play ball. They worked the ball down the field by straight line kicking. This is what won the game for them. These were the plays they were the best developed in. The line men opened huge holes in Drain's line and frequently Ragsdale and Hanan were seen to go through for five to twelve yds at a time. They would lose the ball on punts and then, after regaining it on downs they would regain the lost territory and new territory besides. Twice when they were close to the goal they lost on punts and off side plays. There is where they showed their grit. They did not become disheartened but played better ball and at their third chance, when there was just 8 minutes to play, Hanan carried the ball over the goal for the only touchdown. The ball was downed in the corner of the field and the goal was impossible.
With but eight minutes to play, Drain nerved up and made an excellent fight to even the score. Finnerty broke loose for a 25-yard run. He endeavored to hurdle Gagnon, but the little captain was too wary and downed him and that was Drain's last chance to score. When time was called the high school had possession of the ball in the center of the field.
The individual playing of Drain was better than the local lads but they lacked team work and here is where the high school won.
The sensational players for Drain were, Capt. Moon, Finnerty and Wimberly, while Hanan, Capt. Gagnon and Ragsdale did great work for the local lads.

Items of Interest Gathered and Condense for the Busy Plaindealer Readers
In Uncle Sam's Domain
McCordy declares that he cannot be forced out of the Mutual Life Insurance Co. and the managers of the company seem inclined to take his part in the trouble which confronts him.
William Wilson, a Bellingham, Wash., -tone cutter who has just died, supposedly in subject poverty, turns out to be a millionaire.
Editor Holla of the Walla Walla, Wash., Statesman, has been sued for criminal libel by A. H. Reynolds, a prominent attorney, and at the same time the prosecuting attorney filed an information against him for criminal libel. He put up \$500 bond.
The state of Pennsylvania has secured judgment against the defunct Enterprise National bank directors in the sum of \$2,500,000, for state funds lost in that institution.
President Roosevelt presented a loving cup to John Charles McNeill the well known poet of Raleigh, N. C., many persons witnessing the interesting performance.
The smuggler jewelry of Cassie Chadwick, the noted bank breaker, was put up at auction at Cleveland, O., and although said to be worth all of \$12,000, it only brought \$2,150.
In order to do service in the canal zone, the marines at the Bremerton, Wash., navy yard are ordered to report at Panama.
George E. Cunliffe, who had been working for \$55 per month at Pittsburg, Pa., stole \$100,000 and was captured at Bridgeport, Conn. He said it was a sudden impulse which made him take the money.
Christian Madsen, aged 76, crossed the ocean to marry Miss Edmuth Larsen, of Omaha, who went as far as San Francisco to meet her aged lover.
Thomas W. Lawson, of "frenzied finance" fame, promises to make a raid upon the stock markets of the country, if they are not stopped from their way of doing things.
Chairman Shonts reports that since the advent of Engineer Stevens, work on the isthmus of Panama is making rapid progress. House docks and railroad shops are nearing completion.
Seventy-six residents of Chicago will be given cups by the Mikado for services rendered during the late war with Russia.
W. B. Smith, president of the Western National Bank of Louisville, Ky., has been indicted by the grand jury for misappropriating funds and making false entries.

Receiver J. A. Buchanan, of the West Star Gold Mining & Milling Co., vs A. Mosier, Coshow & Rice for piff, and F. G. Miceli and A. N. Orcutt for the debt, was continued. As was also the case of P. J. Jennings vs Nooday Mining Co., Crawford, Cardwell & Watson, attorneys for the piff, and Woolcock & Potter for the debt.
County Superintendent Hamlin will start out tomorrow, to make a visit to the schools in the southern part of the county, as the law requires him to visit each school in the county, at least once each year. During his absence, Mrs. Hamlin will act as deputy, in his office.
