### SCHOOL TRUANTS TO BE PUNISHED

There is likely to be trouble soon for certain parents who have boys and girls playing truant and not attending school, for the city superintendent and the school board are preparing to enforce the state truant laws and make every child of school age attend school or give a lawful reason for not doing so. It is likely that a truant officer will be employed and every boy or girl found on the streets during school hours and without the proper excuse, will be placed under arrest, and the parents will also be punished by a fine as is provided by the state law.

While the attendance of the Grants Pass schools will average up well with the best towns in Oregon yet there are a number of parents who make no effort to have their children go to school, and there are boys who pretend to go to school and do not, and others who feign sick and fix up other excuses. All these cases will be rightly looked into and the truant will go to school or get into serious trouble. On the excuse of peddling fruit a number of boys have been about the truant, but they do not get enough to justify their being out of school. And this lettering about the truant is paying the way for these boys to grow up without an education and a likelihood of becoming worthless characters and a burden on the public—O.C.S.

### WHAT IS GOING ON AT THE COURTHOUSE

#### Items Which Will be of Interest to the Taxpayers

The regular October apportionment of funds among the public schools of Douglas County has been compiled by Superintendent Hamlin and is given herewith. The total number of eligible school children in the county, as enrolled by the enumerators, is 5,280. The apportionment just made is on the following basis: \$50 to each district irrespective of the number of pupils therein, the remaining \$2 from April of the 90 annual per capita tax required by law, \$1 of which is applied to the \$50 district fund, and \$1.70 per capita from the county's share of the interest on state irreducible school fund.


