County Board in Session

Yesterday the County Board convened and will probably be in session for the rest of the week. An unusually large docket will be passed upon and some matters of more than passing importance will come up for consideration.

Yesterday much of the time of the Board was taken in passing upon and auditing the claims which are outstanding against the county. These will be carefully examined before they are allowed or rejected as the case may be.

The question of the Riddle road was again before the Board and it was found, upon investigation, that more taxpayers had signed the remonstrance than were on the petition which was circulated in favor of the proposed road; accordingly the Board could do nothing but decide to reject the application.

Today a number of matters are being carefully considered, including some road petitions and like matters.

Tomorrow the Board will go in a body to look into the Hall Creek road trouble, near Oakland. It is an appeal from the damages which have been awarded by the appraisers, and requires the personal investigation of the members of the Board.

It is expected that the sessions of the Board will last until about Saturday, unless some unexpected matters of unusual importance come up.

Court House Notes

Judge Harris handed down two decisions in the annexation cases which have been brought in the district court, relative to the annexation of West Roseburg to the city of Roseburg. The court finds that it has no jurisdiction over property which does not concern the parties in litigation. This decision is thought to be a move favorable to the annexationists, although the case is not yet entirely settled.

In the hotly contested divorce case brought by Martha M. Drollinger against Melvin W. Drollinger, Judge Hamilton handed down a decision in which he concludes that neither party is entitled to have a divorce. Each party is to pay its own costs.

The court has issued an order which will restrain defendant Frank M. Stewart from interfering with three of his and his wife's children, during the pendency of the action brought by his wife Minnie E. Stewart, for a divorce. The wife is given custody of the children in the meantime.

Quite a big deed is being entered on the records by Deputy Clerk G. V. Wimberly. It is from Alexander V. Oestron, of Minneapolis, Minn., who conveys to John E. Heimberg, of Denver, Colo., a one-fourth interest in a lot of timber lands which stretch all along through Linn, Lane, Douglas, Coos and Curry counties. In former deeds the same grantor conveyed one-fourth to one party, to another one-tenth, and to a third a one-fortieth interest. It is a voluminous document.
