What is known as the "Gothenburg Saloon System" is now being considered by the Los Angeles city council. The proposition came from twenty-five leading citizens, a number of whom are millionaires. It is proposed by these men as a company to pay to the city \$18,000 per annum for the 200 saloon licenses now in operation there and to reduce the total number of saloons there from 200 to 25. The company offers to acquire the furniture and fixtures and goodwill of the saloons from the present proprietors at an appraised valuation. After the license tax has been paid, the stockholders of the company, under the proposed plan, would be entitled to six per cent dividends from the receipts of the business, on the total amount of their investment, the remainder of the profits from the operation of the twenty-five saloons, to revert to the city treasury.
