

RUMBLINGS FROM THE RAILROAD

C. C. Baker, the freight conductor who was in charge of the train which killed a Greek some months ago, and for which Mr. Baker lost his job, has been in the city mingling with his friends. He has been in the employ of the Oregon Water & Power Co., up north, but he is now hoping to be reinstated on his old run and to this end he has kept his house here furnished. He has many friends who hope this will be the case.

A special rate of oneway, first-class for the round trip, has been granted for the approaching Eighth Annual American Mining convention, which is to be held at El Paso, Texas, soon. The selling dates will be Nov. 8 and 9, while the going limit will be Nov. 15, and the return limit 30 days from date of sale. Stop over privileges will be allowed within transit limits.

Local freight No. 226, Conductor Bickett and Engineer Everett, experienced a slight wreck, by having a stick of wood fall on one of the bridges south of this city, which derailed one of the wheels of the engine tender. This delayed traffic for a few hours, Tuesday evening.

Work on the foundation for the new roundhouse has progressed to a point where Foreman Jones and some of his carpenters were needed to help put in the wall forms, but Foreman Mahoney and his men are not yet done and do not expect to be through for two or three weeks. The job made a wall of concrete, three feet thick at the bottom, seven feet for a foundation and seven feet for the superstructure, the top being thirteen inches thick. The work is being well done and it will last for all time to come.

Contrary to expectations, work on the well digging job has been stopped, although the outfit is still here. The hole was put down about 250 feet, but when about eleven feet at the bottom caved in, the powers at Portland concluded it was time to halt. So work was stopped at once. It is said that the officials at Portland expected to reach water in at least 100 or 200 feet, while the contractor here was figuring on going down all of 500 feet. A Portland party had the contract at \$6 per foot, while the party who came here to do the work took it at \$4.

Fireman Harry Frewing and bride are back in the city and are looking for a suitable place for housekeeping purposes.

Ben Snyder, the engine wiper from Dillard, has been promoted to the job of hostler's helper, and is therefore a resident of this city.

Nelson St. Onge, boss carpenter of the "concrete gang", is mourning the loss of a fine water spaniel dog, which was sent to him recently as a present from some of his Rhode Island friends. The animal has strayed away and Mr. Onge misses it greatly. He would gladly pay a reward for its return.
