

### SUDDEN DEATH OF JOHN GILLAM

Dickard, California, and was en route to his home, with his family, on a boat which he had just chartered. He was in the company of his wife and two children. The cause of death was not known.

The funeral and burial services will be held at the family home, 1215 E. 12th St., Lawrence, on Monday, October 17, at 10 o'clock a.m. The burial will be in the cemetery at Lawrence. Mr. Gillam was a member of the Lawrence Lodge, No. 1215, B. P. O. Elks, and the Lawrence Chapter, No. 1215, O. E. S. He was a native of Lawrence and had resided here for many years.
