A very promising prospect was struck last week by H. Cardwell and William Stephens on Mr. Stephens ranch eight miles from Myrtle Creek. This prospect shows up the best float rock which has been found in the district. They expect to commence development work immediately.

Teams have commenced hauling ore from the "Little Chieftain" again. Mr. Hamilton informs us he expects to ship 800 sacks this time.

Jas. Curtin and Mr. Barker expect to run a tunnel to their ledge on Lady creek. This will necessitate a tunnel about 150 or 200 feet.
