Two of the suggestions made by the grand jury, which recently adjourned, are being carried out. One of these is the placing of a good sized window in the wall which separates the clerk's office from the room occupied by the county board. This will afford much better light and be quite an improvement all around. The other much-needed improvement is the placing of more shelving in the vault room of the sheriff's office. The new laws, which have been enacted in recent years, have required more books for this office and now a large number of them have to be cared for and in order to insure their safety from fire, it is necessary to have the vault fitted up. Contractor Patterson is doing the work.

County Assessor G. W. Staley and his assistant, Frank H. Rogers, are just completing a big undertaking in the shape of the tax rolls for the ensuing year. There are three large volumes and these have required much time and exceedingly careful attention to get them out as nearly correct as it is possible to make them. Now the books will be turned over to County Clerk Agee, who will proceed to make a copy of them for the Sheriff, who is also ex-officio tax collector. Then, after the first of the year when the County Board has fixed the tax levy, he will proceed to extend the rolls, which is, in itself, no sinecure. All special taxes voted for road and school districts must be filed on or before Jan. 1, '06, in order to have the matter included in the next tax levy. The tax levy last year was 25 mills on the dollar and this is regarded as an average, and it is not expected that the levy this year will be any in excess of that figure. That rate included for all county expenses, state, 3 mills for roads, library and indigent soldiers, but did not take account of the special tax voted by the various districts. This year the rolls will show the enormous increase in taxable property in this county of \$650,000 over that of last year.

County Clerk Agee has issued a marriage license to Otis Fisher and Miss Florence Gagnon, both residents of this city. A marriage license was issued to Jacob Yokum and Miss Carrie Williams, of this city, who were united in marriage at the parsonage of the Christian church, Rev. Ritchey officiating. Mrs. M. N. Currier has been appointed guardian of Lyle Gray, son of the late E. Gray. The property consists of a life insurance policy valued at \$500. B. W. Strong, John Metz and Robert Robertson were appointed appraisers of the estate. The deeds for the right-of-way for the new Drain railroad, continue to be filed. Today one was placed on record in which Mary Eccleston is the grantor. In the estate of Madeline Hardin, deceased, the court has made an order directing W. S. Britt, the executor, to pay off certain bequests made in the will, aggregating \$1700. An order has been made in the estate of Thomas Coates, deceased, directing that the preferred claims of Dr. B. L. Bradley and W. S. Hamilton, for services and goods furnished during the last illness of the deceased, be paid at once. Court Reporter Ira B. Riddle is one of the busy men these days. The Plaindealer man ran onto him, while making the rounds at Riddle, and found him "head-over-heels" in work, getting up transcripts on appeal to the Supreme court of the state of several cases which were tried at the last term of the circuit court in Douglas county. One of the most voluminous of these was that of the Greeks who were indicted by the grand jury for inciting a riot at Glenbrook, at the time when Mrs. J. A. Petersen was killed and whom the jury in the circuit court afterwards adjudged as guilty. This transcript contains several hundred pages and was a big job for Mr. Riddle, but he was equal to the emergency and got it out in ample time and in excellent shape. There are several others which he is now grinding away on and will soon be in readiness for the attorneys. In the person of Mr. Riddle the members of the Douglas county bar realize that they have a most excellent and competent court reporter. Having taken a thorough law course, he is up on all the intricacies which nettles one who is not well versed in Blackstone, and he gives entire satisfaction.
