The result of the elections last week is one in which every American, regardless of party ties, may rejoice. Corruption and bossism received staggering blows in New York, Philadelphia, Cincinnati and Baltimore. Civic virtue has asserted itself everywhere with emphasis. Party lines disappeared and the masses of the voters gave their ballots for men and principles with an independence that has strengthened the faith of believers in self government.

Representative Landis says that the eulogistic speeches made in congress upon the death of a member are greatly in demand by preachers who deliver them again from their pulpits. We always thought on hearing them from congressmen that it was the congressmen who had stolen them from the preachers.

One of the busy persons around the court house these fine days is Janitor Perry. He finds his hands pretty full, getting enough fuel to keep all the office in comfortable condition. One of his tasks has been to keep the lawn looking nice and the falling leaves have been bothering him not a little. However, Saturday he made a final clean-up for the season, along this line.

Sheriff McClallen informs the Plaindealer that complaint has been made to the effect that certain out-of-town parties gave three ladies, who were returning to their homes in North Roseburg, the other night a bad scare. The fellows had been imbibing too freely and ran their horses on the sidewalk, scaring the ladies so badly that they ran into a near-by yard for protection. Sheriff McClallen was notified of the performance and he says the parties are well known and that when they come back in town again they will be summarily dealt with.

Recently the Plaindealer had an account of a suit which had been commenced by Kate Ingalls, against George Turner, wherein the complaint alleged that the wrong land had been pointed out by Mr. Turner, for the plaintiff to take up as a homestead. Mr. Turner called and informed the Plaindealer that the bringing of the suit was all a surprise to him and he further stated that for many years he had been engaged in locating people on government land that this was the only time where he had an experience of this kind and that he regretted it exceedingly. "I had a deputy county surveyor go out there, at my expense and go over the matter, in the hopes that it might be unravelled and I have even gone and written to the attorney-general of the state to see if it is possible for an error to have been made in laying out the metes and bounds of land. Of course I do not blame the Plaindealer for printing an account of the matter, for it is a matter of public record, and I appreciate your willingness to give my explanation as prominent mention."

For the past few days Sheriff McClallen has been kept on the jump, getting over the county to make sales as ordered by the Circuit court. Saturday he was at Drain on such an errand and today he is at Canyonville.

County Clerk Agee is mailing notices to the various district school clerks, road supervisors and town and city clerks, throughout the county, notifying them that if their district is to have any special tax levy this year, they must turn the same in, on or before January 1st, or be left out of the calculations this year, as some were done last year. As there are 134 schools and 52 road districts, this is a no small task in itself.

Mary and Richard Green have instituted a suit by their attorneys, Cardwell & Watson, against Mary Andrews and others to get a road kept open near Yoncalla, over which there seems to be some misunderstanding. The complaint alleges that for fifty years it has been in use until recently, when the defendants closed it up. They ask the court to issue an order restraining the defendants from interfering in the matter and asking that an unlocked gate be placed on the premises in question.

Messrs Grant Stephens, E. W. Elliot and M. J. Stock, the appraisers of the estate of Eugene Comer, an insane person who lived near Canyonville, have filed a report of their findings, which show an estate valued at \$494.50.

The second annual report of E. V. Hoover, guardian of Cass S. Hooper, an incompetent person, has been placed on record. It shows that \$1216.09 has been collected and \$122 expended.

In the estate of B. B. Brockway deceased, the semi-annual report of Mary Brockway the executrix, has been placed on record, showing \$132 receipts and \$129.50 expenditures.

County Clerk Agee has been called upon to register Alvin Fernando Sether, a physician of Glendale, who is a graduate of Rush Medical College, of Chicago and Edward H. White, a dentist of Glendale, as required by law.
