## THANKSGIVING VERY FITTINGLY OBSERVED

### Union Services Were Held and the People Turned Out to Participate

Today is Thanksgiving day and the people of Roseburg are observing the important occasion in a fitting manner. The majority of the business houses are closed for the day, while the county and city offices are having a holiday, and the postoffice is having "Sunday" hours. The streets present very much of a holiday appearance, and everything indicates that the day is being fittingly observed.

A large and appreciative audience assembled at the First Methodist church at 11 a. m. to engage in the time-honored union service. The edifice was appropriately decorated for the occasion, and nothing was left undone that would add to the interest of the occasion. The program carried out was substantially as follows:

The sermon by Rev. E. H. Hicks, the popular pastor of the First Baptist church, was an able effort and was greatly appreciated by all who were fortunate enough to hear it. A brief synopsis of the discourse is here given. Taking the ninety-fifth Psalm and second verse as his text, Rev. Hicks gave this outline:

The first Thanksgiving day celebration was held at Plymouth after the first harvest in the new world. The day after the surrender at Yorktown, Gen. Washington ordered divine services held in all the divisions. When the news reached Philadelphia, Congress went to the Dutch Lutheran church for a thanksgiving service, at 2 p. m. Oct. 23. The news was received in France with a like recognition of Divine favor.

The first national Thanksgiving proclamation was issued by Gen. Washington in January 1795.

"Now, as you know, the Presidents have a custom of proclaiming a given day each year for the expression of our gratitude. We should thank former generations for their help. The Jews for their preservation of the Old Testament, a background to the New, which contains our gospel; Shakespeare, Longfellow and others for our literature. Critics tell us that two-thirds of Shakespeare's plays were clutched from the Italian novelists who had taken them from the East. All boys plays are Asiatic. For art and sculpture we go to Rome to study the masters. The long chain leads us on back to God whom we should thank for temporal and spiritual blessings. We shall know better dimensions of his love when we fall in Thanksgiving at his feet. When we look around on the home Jesus is preparing for us, we will thank him more than ever we can here below."

Excellent music was provided by the First Methodist choir. A freewill offering was taken at the close of the services, which was turned over to the Methodist Ladies' Aid, which will be disbursed among the worthy poor of the city, by members of that organization. All in all the services were very impressive and were enjoyed by all in attendance.

At St. George's Episcopal church, Rev. C. H. Lake delivered an eloquent address, which was listened to by a good
