AN ACT to take away the circuit court jurisdiction of the district court of the United States for the northern district of Georgia, to create a circuit court in said district, and for other purposes.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled:

That so much of any act or acts of Congress as vests in the district court of the United States for the horthern district of Georgia the power and jurisdiction of a circuit court be, and the same is hereby, repealed; and there hereafter be a circuit court held for said district, presided over as the circuit court now is, or hereafter may be, in the southern district.
