Since that date up to the present, there lejo, 25,000 barrels of flour and about 1.000,000 bushels of wheat, equal to about 37,500 tons. leaving in that State at present in round num-

bers, 281,000 tons. Of this, there will be, perhaps, less than 140,000 tons available for export.
