NEAH BAY, W. T., Nov. 16 .- The statement of Neil O'Henley, late quartermaster of the ill-fated steamer Pacific, rescued by the U. S. Revenue cutter Wolcott, Captain

Harwood commander, is as follows: On the morning of the 17th last, we left Victoria, B. C., at 9 o'clock A. M., with about 250 persons on board. All went well. We passed Tatoosh light about 4 P.
