EASTERN.

A Spiritual Medium in a Police Court.
LONDON, Oct. 2.—An American spiritual medium was in the police court today, in answer to two summonses taken out on proof of Edwin Ray Lankester, F. R. S. & C. The first summons is under a warrant act, and the second charges him with conspiring with one Simmons, his assistant, to defraud. The charge of conspiracy was first proceeded with Prof. Lankester deposed that he had seen Slade write the messages which he professed were spiritual manifestations. The case excites great interest and the court room was crowded. After the hearing the case was adjourned for one week, Slade and Simmons being admitted to bail.

Ohio Claims for the Republicans 1,000 Majority.

NEW YORK, Oct. 3.—The Times, Cleveland correspondent, after a careful study of the subject and many journeys over the State, predicts that Ohio will give the Republicans from 10,000 to 30,000 majority next week.

Colorado Election.

DENVER, Col., Oct. 3.—Reports from the principal points at 3 P. M., indicate heavy Republican gains everywhere over the election of 1874. The chairman of the Republican State Committee claims the State by about 20,000 majority, and the legislature by a majority of 40 on joint ballot.

Newark Gains in Connecticut.

NEWARK, Oct. 3.—The town goes Republican by 571 majority against 285 last year. All the constitutional amendments were ratified nearly unanimously. Canterbury shows a Republican gain of 40; Plainfield 50; and other towns similar gains. Hartford elect a mixed ticket, including the Republican candidate for selectmen. The towns within easy range of Hartford, which gave 860 Democratic majority in April, now give 136 Republican majority, showing a gain of 1,000. Other gains elsewhere are proportionately large.

CHICAGO, Oct. 4.—E. A. Woodward, late partner of Wm. M. Tweed, for whom a large reward has been offered, was arrested here this afternoon at the Palmer house where he was registered as A. Wallace, Liverpool. He was disguised but was recognized by a New York gentleman and pointed out to police and locked up at the Central station house, where he will be retained until further steps are taken by the New York authorities. He was uncommunicative to reporters, but he said to Police Superintendent Hickey that he had just arrived from England by way of Savannah, and that he had not seen Tweed for five years. A man registered as J. B. Blomont was with him at the time of his arrest and remained with him at the station by permission.

FOREIGN NEWS.

Affairs at Constantinople.

A correspondent at Constantinople telegraphs that the situation there is really critical. The incendiary character of articles in public prints is such that he thinks it urgent that the American fleet be sent to the Bosphorus to protect the lives and property of Americans.

Gold for America.

LONDON, Oct. 3.—Five thousand pounds worth of American eagles were withdrawn from the Bank of England yesterday for shipment to the United States. The shipments are expected to continue the value of money being no low that the loss of interest while the gold is in transit is of no importance.

Bummed Massacre of Germans.

BUCHAREST, Oct. 3.—It is rumored that a brother of Harry Abbot, German consul at Salonica, assassinated last May, has been massacred, together with his family, near Salonica.

A Times dispatch from Thrapin says four murders have been committed on property of Robert Abbott, at Salonica. The Prime of one of the villages and his wife have been killed. Many other murders are reported.

PACIFIC COAST.

Attempted Suicide.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 2.—About noon today some soldiers discovered a man near Presidio with his throat cut. The post surgeon took him in charge, and after bandaging the wound sent him to the city prison hospital. His name is found to be Ferdinand Newmark. The cause of the attempted suicide is financial troubles. There is but little hope of his recovery.

Suicide of a Sport.

This afternoon Patrick Hogan, well known in sporting circles, shot himself in left breast in North Point street. He was impelled to the act by having lost a large amount of money on credit a few evenings ago, which he had promised to pay at noon today. The wound will probably prove fatal. Hogan was well known among the sporting fraternity of the State and Nevada.

Another Suicide.

A few minutes past one o'clock this P. M., the inmates of house No. 124, Fourth street, heard the report of a pistol apparently in a room on one of the upper floors. Attention was called to the room occupied by Bernhard Bendel, the door was burst open and the occupant was discovered in an arm chair holding a revolver in his right hand, and in the left hand a cigar and his hat. Blood was oozing from a bullet wound above the right ear, but the man was still breathing. A messenger was sent for a physician, but the man died a few minutes after he was found. It

Are Our Reports Compared and Doctored?

If Doctored it is a Clear Case of Malpractice.

If Mr. Watkins has received illegal salary or interest, other officers are to blame, and the matter should be carefully looked up and properly adjusted.

THE NEW COUNTY.

LONG TOM, Oct. 2.

ED. STATESMAN:—The feeling for the new county is waxing hot and gaining every day. In our first communication we gave six reasons why the new county ought to be organized, all of which are tacitly admitted by the people and press. In this we give the seventh, which constitutes the closing link in the chain of reasons for the organization of New County. It is this, the majority of the legal voters and tax-payers within the limits of the proposed county have petitioned the Legislature to grant them a separate county organization. Said petitioners represent the majority of freeholders in the proposed county and a heavy preponderance of the taxpayers in the same limits.

There are remonstrances at Halsey, Brownsville, Monroe and Junction city, ostensibly against the new county, but really against the county seat. The remonstrating leaders at the points named are decidedly in favor of a new county and are ready to locate the boundary lines, but invariably in such a way as to give their respective towns an advantage to secure the county seat without a just and proper regard for the rights of the old counties or the convenience and interest of the people in the new county. To illustrate, the people of Halsey and Brownsville suggest that the boundary lines between Linn and the proposed county should be drawn many miles north of where it is, despoiling Linn of her choicest territory and offering thereby no conveniences or advantages to the people in the new county they do not enjoy in the old. The remonstrators at Junction City say, "cut deeper into Lane on the south of us, and deeper into Benton on the north, this will give us a show for the county seat." This we cannot do so long as we are disposed to respect the rights of others. Let any candid person examine the map and he will see that by making the above suggested changes there would not only be a wrong inflicted on the old counties, but it would also impose a wrong on a portion of the people in the new county, as it would make it further and more inconvenient to reach the county seat in the new county than it is now in the old counties. But the boundary lines of the new county, as petitioned for, no such objection can be made, and upon this line we must stand or fall.

MR. STAATS HEARD FROM.

ED. STATESMAN:—At the close of the biographical sketch of the life of Stephen Staats, you say that his hopes in reference to the burial of the "bloody shirt" are doomed to be blasted. By this do you mean to say that you are opposed to the burial of that garment, and to all the reminiscences connected with the effects and results of the war? If so, make your position known; if you are determined to revive all the animosities, all the hatred, the all issues that may have been involved in that cruel strife, say so; but if you are willing to drop these things and are willing to work to harmonize conflicting differences and to throw your influence for the best interests of our common country, say so, but for God's sake, don't flaunt the bloody shirt in our faces to engender contention and strife among those who should be workers in a common cause, and that cause, the interests of a common humanity and the welfare of all those who are bound together by a feeling of honor and the welfare of people whose interests are identical and who should work for the welfare of all, and not for the interest of any party who desire to advance their own political interests at the sacrifice of the interest of a people who must live together and sink or swim on the same current that floats them to the harbor of peace and prosperity, or engulf them in the maelstrom of political strife and hopeless reformation from the doom of the damned.

GREAT SPEECH!

SENATOR J. H. MITCHELL IN PORTLAND.

An Immense Crowd at the Oro Fino Theater to Hear Oregon's Favorite Senator.

Wild Enthusiasm of the Audience, etc., etc.

(Special to Daily Statesman.)

ED. STATESMAN:—Our distinguished townsman, Senator J. H. Mitchell, by special invitation, addressed an immense audience this Tuesday evening, in this city, at the Oro Fino theater. It having been announced that Mr. Mitchell would speak, a grand rush was made at an early hour to secure seats. Before 7:30 o'clock P. M. the edifice was crowded to its utmost capacity, there not being even standing room left.

The vast audience who listened to this eloquent speech of genius and logic, admired its many and varied beauties, and the wonderful capacity of thought, constantly cheering and exclaiming, "that is so." In a very forcible manner the speaker showed that it would be exceedingly unwise and dangerous to admit into the councils of the nation any but those who have given sufficient and unmistakable evidence of their loyalty, advising the people of this nation to wait until the sound of the cannon had died away before they permit the enemies of the government to control it. Although Mr. Mitchell had been sick all day, he made the best speech that he has ever been our fortune to hear, giving an account of his stewardship in the U. S. Senate.

The speaker retired amid the wild applause of the vast audience, all rising simultaneously and cheering him again and again.

PORTLAND, Oct. 3, 1876.

THE TREASURER'S OFFICE AND MR. GOLDSMITH.

ED. STATESMAN:—The Legislature of 1874 passed an act directing the State Treasurer to loan the State land fund, which had accumulated, amounting to some \$40,000. Mr. B. Goldsmith sued out an injunction to prevent the loan, on the ground that the faith of the State was pledged to so administer the fund as to make it applicable in the redemption of the Lock Bonds, at the earliest day practicable, and that it was the duty of the Treasurer to so apply it. This view was finally sustained by the Supreme Court after a trial in which Mr. Goldsmith's attorney represented both sides of the case, and an order was made directing the Treasurer to apply the \$40,000 in redemption of bonds held by Goldsmith. This order was made about January last. An examination of the Treasurer's report shows that Goldsmith has never presented a Lock Bond for redemption, but that he has continued to draw interest on Lock Bonds held by him, at the rate of about \$15,000 per annum. It appears further that on the 9th of September last, two days before the Legislature met, there was paid \$40,000 to the bank of British Columbia in redemption of eighty Lock Bonds. The inference is plain. The judicial proceedings were brought so that the Treasurer might shield himself behind a restraining order, from loaning funds for the State. If the purpose of the proceedings was to get the bonds paid, why was not the money so used long ago? Goldsmith has continued to draw interest upon all the bonds held by him at the time he enjoined the Treasurer, and if the \$40,000 which the court ordered paid to redeem them, has drawn any interest, the State has not received it. The State has lost the interest on \$40,000 for more than six months, and has not saved anything in interest on the Lock Bonds. These proceedings are open to the suspicion of collusion between the Treasurer's office and Goldsmith, by which the two, the interest on both the fund and the bonds which the court ordered to be redeemed with the fund has been "gobbled up."

NIGHT SESSION.

Wednesday Night, October 4th.

The House met at 7 o'clock P. M., on a special order to consider the "Female Suffrage Memorial." There was considerable amusement growing out of amendments and other motions. The good looking young member from Yamhill made an eloquent speech, "sticking a pin" in all who disagreed with him.

Mr. Lawrence made a forcible speech in favor of the resolution to submit the question of female suffrage to a vote of the people.

Mr. Haines spoke at length in favor of female suffrage. He believes the ladies should govern instead of the men—thought they would have been exporting sugar from the south if they had taken the government instead of negroes. His speech was most eloquent, but he took occasion to call the ladies the "lowest strata," which was not considered complimentary.

Mr. Fidler made one of the best speeches of the evening, carefully handling many phases of the subject, and in a manner which could not be unpleasant to any hearers. He held that voting would be a burthen which men have no right to impose on women, who have a higher and nobler sphere in which the creator designed them to move.

Dr. Payton touched a tender chord in favoring female suffrage, and brought out loud cheers.

Mr. Ferguson made some humorous remarks. He was willing to swap male niggers for white females, and give some boot.

A large number of ladies were present in the lobby which deterred many from making speeches when they were fully prepared for great efforts.

An adjournment was effected at about ten o'clock, without taking a vote on the main question.

WEBSTER AND HAYNE DISCOUNTED.

The two leading orators of the House, Mr. Cheesman and Mr. Staats, had an intellectual "set to" on Thursday, on the subject of female suffrage, which was of great interest to all lovers of oratory. Nearly the whole forenoon was spent in the "measurement of arms," but certainly no one regards the time as lost. It is well to settle these important questions as we come to them, and all those knotty questions which have puzzled political economists for ages, should be brought up in turn and finally settled by the Oregon Legislature.

DEPARTING.
