EASTERN.

Convicted of Murder.

NEW YORK. Nov. 6.—Charles Aschwald and Thos. Ryan have been found guilty of the murder of officer Brooken, Newark, New Jersey, August 31, last. The officer had detected them committing burglary.

Caught Him.

BAKERSFIELD. Nov. 6.—Jas. Hayes, who murdered Jas. Goddin, at Tehachipa, on the 20th ult., was captured at Ascalico landing, near Guadalupe, in Ventura county, Saturday, Nov. 4th, by deputy Sheriff Harry Blodworth, assisted by Doc Frazer. The culprit was in a small house near the landing, and was evidently not expecting molestation. The shotgun which he had loaded a short time before with the design, as he said, of shooting ducks in the lake near by, within a few feet of him when the officers entered. Mr. Blodworth, immediately upon entering, covered him with his six-shooter and commanded him to throw up his hands. Within a glance at the gun, and apparently realizing the hopelessness of the situation, he obeyed, and handcuffs were placed upon him without resistance. The officers, with their prisoner, immediately set out and arrived at Bakersfield about six o'clock this evening. A good deal of excitement prevailed when the party arrived, and if Hayes had been brought through Tehachipa, the scene of his crime, in all probability he would have been hanged without the formality of a trial. He is now in jail under guard, where he will remain till brought to trial. Hayes evidently intended to escape on a schooner that was then loading at the landing, as he had been inquiring about her departure and destination during the day.

Accident to Ex-senator Carpenter.

MILWAUKEE. Nov. 6.—Hon. Matt Carpenter, to-day, while stepping into a carriage to go to Racine to fill an engagement to speak, slipped on the snow and fell backward, the back of his head striking on the sharp curb. An artery was ruptured by the concussion. The injury is not necessarily dangerous.

CHICAGO. Nov. 6.—A committee of twelve citizens yesterday presented a petition of 8,000 signatures, in Chicago asking Judge McAllister to resign, on account of his conduct in the recent Sullivan-Saunder murder trial. After the judgment had made his address presenting it, the judge remarked: "Leave it with the clerk; I am a man of the world; I have nothing more to do with the matter." It is not expected here that he will not comply with the request.

News from New York.

NEW YORK. Nov. 7.—The rear portion of a building, corner of Eighth and 83d Broadway, took fire this afternoon. Miner's art gallery building was damaged \$1,000 and the piano keys suffered slight damage by burning. The first floor of 811 Broadway, occupied by G. L. Peters, dealer in music, came in stock, \$3,000.

PACIFIC COAST.

Suicide.

SAN FRANCISCO. Nov. 6.—Simon Gilberman, a barber living at lodging house, No. 17, Fourth street, was found dead in his bed this morning, having shot himself through the heart. This act was probably committed Saturday evening, as he had not left his room since.

Another Stage Robbery.

REDDING. Nov. 6.—The Weaverville and Redding stage was stopped to-night near this place by two highwaymen, who demanded Wells & Fargo's box, which the driver handed down, but as the treasure was in an iron box fastened to the coach, they got nothing but a few letters.

SAN FRANCISCO. Nov. 6.—Col. Fry, of San Francisco, has commenced a suit for the foreclosure of a mortgage against the Utter mine in Coos county, amounting to about \$45,000.

FOREIGN NEWS.

The Eastern War.

LONDON. Nov. 6.—The Times, in a leader, says: We think with the majority of our countrymen that the chances are in favor of peace, and of such a peace as may assure the well-being of the regions concerned, by removing every pretext for war.

A Belgrade dispatch to the Times says: It is reported that Gen. Tchernyeff will sojourn in Russia during the armistice. Russian officers express the belief that thousands of Russians have fallen in the

valley of Morava alone. They openly accuse the Servians of bayoneting Russians who attempted, revolver in hand, to urge them to attack the Turks.

The Standard's Belgrade correspondent reports that some wounded Russian officers had been robbed and hacked to pieces by men appointed to carry them to the rear.

A Vienna dispatch to the Times says: Except Germany, which will probably not interfere, all the powers have appointed commissioners for drawing the line of demarcation. Turkey and the majority of the powers think the line could be fixed by the positions held by the opposing armies when the armistice was agreed to, but Russia seems disposed to ask the Turks to withdraw to the frontier.

PARIS. Nov. 5.—The Moniteur, organ of the Minister of foreign affairs, says it appears probable that all guaranteeing powers will agree to a proposal for a conference at Constantinople.

A telegram from Ragusa states that the French and Italian commissioners have proceeded to the Turkish and Montenegrin camps to fix the line of demarcation, and places blockaded by Montenegrins will continue under blockade during the armistice, but may be revictuallized sufficiently for immediate wants.

The Eastern Question.

LONDON. Nov. 6.—Private advices from Constantinople represent negotiations going on for a direct understanding between Turkey and Russia which would render the European conference unnecessary.

BERLIN. Nov. 6.—Minister Von Bulow, chief of foreign affairs of the Empire, in a speech before the Reichstag, to-day on the Eastern question, declared the affairs of Turkey were not likely to affect Germany directly or indirectly. The policy of the Government was that Germany should always remain firm.

LONDON. Nov. 6.—The Vienna correspondent of the Standard says the Port is yielding to the demands of Russia, and has agreed to relinquish the positions captured by the Turks since the night of October 31st. Hence the evacuation of Deligrado.

The Post in a leader announces that England has proposed a conference at Constantinople. The conference is on the basis of the integrity and independence of the Ottoman Empire.

Japan and Her Rebels.

PARIS. Nov. 8.—A telegram from Japan, November 6th, says the Japanese naval and military force attacked the insurgents that day at Agari, in the province of Nagato. The insurgents were beaten and fled.
