NEW RATES OF POSTAGE.

Hardly a day passes but we are asked for information relative to the present postage law on newspapers and letters. Below we give the rates as they now stand, which every business man should cut out and paste up for future reference.

Postal cards, one cent each, go without further charge to all parts of the United States and Canada, with an additional one cent stamp they go to all parts of Europe.

All letters to all parts of the United States and Canada, three cents per half ounce.

Local, or "drop" letters, that is, for the city or town where deposited, two cents if delivered by carriers, and one cent where there is no carrier system.

Newspaper, daily, semi-weekly, weekly, and weekly, regularly issued and sent to regular subscribers, two cents per pound, payable at the office of publication; news-papers and magazines less frequently than once a week, three cents per pound.

All other printed matter, including transient newspapers, pamphlets, handbills, and books, one cent for each two ounces, or fraction thereof.

On unsized circulars, and all mailable matter of the third class, other than that designed in the foregoing section, postage, as heretofore, one cent for each ounce or fraction thereof.

The following are the postal rates throughout Europe. The rates for letters are for the half ounce, or fraction thereof, and those for newspapers for four ounces, or fraction thereof.

To Great Britain and Ireland, letters five cents; newspapers two cents; France, letters five cents, newspapers two cents; Spain, letters five cents, newspapers two cents; to all parts of Germany, including Austria, letters five cents, newspapers two cents; Denmark, letters five cents, newspapers two cents; Switzerland, letters five cents, newspapers two cents; Italy, letters five cents, newspapers two cents; Russia, letters five cents, newspapers two cents; Norway, letters five cents, newspapers two cents; Sweden, letters five cents, newspapers two cents; Turkey, European and Asiatic, letters five cents, newspapers two cents; Egypt, letters five cents, newspapers two cents.

Packages containing liquids, poisons, glass, explosive chemicals, live animals, sharp-pointed articles, sugar, flour, or any other matter liable to damage or destroy the contents of the mail, are unmissible, are not placed in or allowed to pass through the mails, under any circumstances.

By a late act of Congress, also, all letters or circulars relating to letters, gift certificates, or schemes of chance of any description, are declared to be unmailable, and entirely excluded.

of which the list is numerous, and are more closely connected with the general health than the majority of people are aware. Eighth. The revenue necessary for the current expenditures and the obligations of the public debt must be largely derived from duties upon importations, which, so far as possible, should be adjusted to promote the interests of American labor and advance the prosperity of the whole country.

Ninth. We again affirm our opinion that no further grants of public lands should be made to corporations and monopolies, and demand that the national domain be devoted to free homes for the people.

Tenth. It is the imperious duty of the Government so to modify the existing treaties with European Governments that the same protection shall be afforded to the adopted American nation that is given to the native born, and that all necessary laws should be passed to protect emigrants in the absence of power in the States for that purpose.

Eleventh. It is the immediate duty of Congress to fully investigate the effect of the emigration and importation of Mongolians upon the health and safety of the country.

Twelfth. The Republican party recognizes with approval the standard advanced recently by the Legislature of Oregon, in establishing educational facilities for the women by the many important amendments effected by Republican Legislatures in the land, which concern the personal property relations of wives, mothers and widows, by the appointment and election of women to the superintendence of education, charities and other public trusts. The honest demands of this class of citizens for additional rights, privileges and immunities should be treated with judicious consideration.

Thirteenth. The Constitution confers upon Congress the sovereign power of the Territories of the United States for their government, and in the exercise of this power it is the right and duty of Congress to prohibit and extirpate in the Territories all forms of barbarism, polygamy, and we demand such legislation as shall secure this end and the supremacy of American institutions in all the Territories.

Fourteenth. The pledges which the nation has given to her soldiers and sailors must be fulfilled, and a grateful people will always hold those who imperiled their lives for their country in preservation in the kindest remembrance.

Fifteenth. We sincerely deprecate all sectional feelings and tendencies. We therefore notice with deep solicitude that the Democratic party counts as its chief hope of success upon the electoral vote of the United States secured through the efforts of those who were recently arrayed against the nation, and invite the earnest attention of the country to the grave truth that a second time achieved would reopen sectional strife and imperil the national honor and human rights.

Sixteenth. We charge the Democratic party with being the same in character and spirit as when it sympathized with treason, with making in control of the House of Representatives the triumph and opportunity of the nation's recent foes, with necessitating and applauding in the national capital the sentiments of disloyalty rebellion, with sending Union soldiers to the war, and promoting Confederate soldiers to the front, with deliberately proposing to repudiate the plighted faith of the Government, with being equally false and impudent upon these overshadowing fanatical questions, avoiding the ends of justice by its parties, mismanagement and obloquy of investigations, while it has throughout the period of its ascendancy in the lower House of Congress utterly incompetent to administer the government, and was wiser the country against trusting a party thus alike impudent, recreant and incapable.

Seventeenth. The National Administration merit praise for its honorable work in the management of domestic and foreign affairs, and President Grant deserves the continued hearty gratitude of the American people for his patriotism and his eminent services in war and peace.


