A Large Tree Falls from the Bank of the River on the Forward Deck of the Willamente Chief -- A Lucky

Escape for Passengers, Officers and Crew.


While the steamer Willamette Chief was coming down the river. Saturday, when near the mouth of the Luckiamute, above Buena Vista. she had a remarkably narrow escape from a fearful accident. The beat was steaming along down at a good rate o' speed, and was passing near the shore, which ends in a high and somewhat abrupt bank, when a tree about two feet thick at the butt, that had been uprosted, fell into the stream. The trunk of the descending tree struck on the forward deck and was fortunately broken in twals, by the force of the fall. Strange as it may appear the damage to the boat is comparisively slight. If the boat had passed a few rods further down the stream when the tree struck it, the upper works would have been badly demolished, a number on board inevitably killed, a presibility of the boat being sunk at once. As it resulted, no one was injured and the boat escaped with trivial damages. To intimate that the accident gave all on board a precious good scare, would be but a feeble way of expressing it. No one observed the falling tree until just before it struck. Had it been seen when it first started, so little time was rcquired in its descent that it would have been impossible for the pilot to have carried his boat beyond danger's reach. Altogether considered. it was a providential escape to the stamer and to all on board.


