After all those bardships Mr. M. arrived in Oregon, in May, 1840, and being a carpenter by trade, engaged as the mission curpenter. In 1843, he took up a claim which he farmed until 1849; finally abandoning this he followed the mercabtile line until 1853, to Balem. In 1872, he was appointed as one of the three commissioners on the now Pentientivry buildings, and also appointed as superintendent of the State Capitol. both of which places of trust he filled with credit to himself and to the general satisfaction of the people at large.

While it may be true that the transcript does not show enough to justify this Court in reversing the judgment of the Court below, that would not be a reason for dismissing the appeal. A motion to affirm the judgment of the Court below might be entermined by the Court, and that motion would bring directly before this Court the proposition whether or not there is any question presented by the transcript that would enable the Court here to reverse the judgment.
