

## HIGHLY IMPORTANT FROM EUROPE.

THE ALLIES IN THE AZOFF.

Bombardment Renewed.

THE "WHITE TOWER" AND "MAME-  
LON" ATTACKED AND CAPTURED.

News from Sevastopol to San Fran-  
cisco in Thirty-five Days!

By the arrival of the Atlantic and St. Louis at New York, we have dates from Liverpool by the former to the 2d June, and by the latter to the 6th—ten days later than those received by the St. Louis.

The news is again of a highly exciting character.

The bombardment of Sevastopol was recommenced on the 6th of June, and on the day the steamer sailed, a dispatch was received from Lord Raglan, dated "June 8th, 6 o'clock p. m." announcing that after a fierce bombardment, the French attacked and carried the "Mamelon" and the "White Tower," the gigue gallantly being displayed on both sides.

The loss both to the Russians and the French was very great, but no figures are given.

This event gave great buoyancy to the public feeling, and caused a slight rise in Consols.

The news other than the above presents no features of striking importance.

The French account says the Russians burned thirty transports as well as their four steamships, and destroyed 360,000 sacks of corn, 160,000 sacks oats, and 100,000 sacks of flour. In the evening fourteen allied steamers entered the Sea of Azoff.

Gen. Pelissier, the new commander in the Crimea, is very popular, and now great operations are looked for—among others, the cutting off of Liprandi's army. Omer Pasha, it is said, offers to take and hold Sympheneopol with his Turks, if the French support his advances. The allies now amount to about 200,000—120,000 French, 30,000 British, 40,000 Turks and 11,000 Sardinians. The army is reported as well supplied with the necessaries and luxuries. Some fever and cholera are reported. There has been some occasional severe fighting at night.

There was great mortality among the Austrian troops at Galicia, 15,000 dead, and 23,000 in the hospital.

BURNING OF A MAGAZINE AT ARA-  
BAT.—The allied ships had succeeded in blowing up a magazine at Arbat and in destroying about 100 merchant vessels. Only one steamer remained of the enemy's force in the Sea of Azoff.

OPERATIONS AGAINST THE SHAH OF PERSIA.—It will be recollect that the Shah of Persia has recently openly announced his adhesion to the Russian side of the question. The allies are about to commence operations against him. Letters from Bombay dated the 30th April state that an important and powerful expedition, consisting of 15,000 men, were ready to proceed to the Persian Gulf and commence the offensive against the Shah. There are eight heavily armed steamships, six smaller ones, ten river boats well armed, and twelve gun-boats. The fleet will be commanded by Rear-Admiral Sir Henry Leake, Commander-in-Chief of the Indian Navy.

SUCCESSES IN THE SEA OF AZOFF.—From a despatch received at the Admiralty from Sir E. Lyons at Kertch, dated May 31, it appears that the squadron in the Sea of Azoff had appeared before Genitchi, landed a body of seamen and marines, and after driving the Russian force from the place, had destroyed all the depots and vessels laden with corn and supplies for the Russian army. Only one man was wounded. Since entering the Sea of Azoff, four steamers of war and 140 vessels employed in conveying supplies to the Russian army in the Crimea, have been destroyed.

Later advices from the Sea of Azoff state that the steam Bottia of the allies has destroyed above 200 vessels and 6,000,000 of rations of corn and flour destined for the Russian army of Sevastopol.

THE CONFERENCE.—Probably the most important news received by the steamer from Europe, is that the Vienna Conference re-assembled on the afternoon of the 4th inst., and almost immediately finally dissolved, leaving the war destinies of the contending powers to be arbitrated by the sword alone.—At this meeting the Austrian Minister offered a new proposition—the nature of which is not explained—to the Russian representative. This document he wished to transmit to St. Petersburg, but the Ambassadors of France and England not being commissioned to accede to such a course, the meeting was adjourned *sine die*. The Allied successes in the Sea of Azoff are confirmed, and additional advantages gained by them reported.

### The Very Latest.

The latest news from Europe contained in the Atlantic papers brought by the Stephens, is to the 6th of June. On the afternoon of the 20th, the day the steamer for California sailed from New York, the Asia arrived at Halifax with dates from Liverpool to June 9th, three days later. The news was in full

duly telegraphed from Halifax to New York for the San Francisco *Herald*, and was just in time for the California steamer. It reached us in the short space of thirty-four days from Liverpool, and thirty-five days from Sevastopol—the quickest trip on record.

### Arrival of the Asia at Halifax.

The Royal Mail Steamship Asia, Capt. Lott, arrived at this port at an early hour this morning. She left Liverpool on the afternoon of Saturday, 9th June; her advices are consequently three days later than those received by the St. Louis.
