**ALFALFA SEED**

LOOK OUT FOR ADULTERATED SEED.—Owing to short crops in Utah successively for two or three years, a great deal of alfalfa seed has been imported from Europe (especially from Germany) by seed dealers that is adulterated to cheapen it. This adulterated seed contains from 30 to 40 per cent. of yellow trefoil besides other weed seeds. Trefoil seed closely resembles alfalfa seed but costs about \$2.00 per hundred pounds.
