**JIM STIKONA MURDERED**

**Found on the Hill North of Town with His Head Crushed.**

Monday morning about 11 o'clock word was brought to Madras that an Indian was murdered on the road one mile north of town and investigation showed that it was Jim Stikona, well known in this vicinity and generally spoken of as a good Indian. His skull was crushed so that brains and blood were issuing from his forehead. A broken demijohn was found near his body which had the appearance of having been beaten on something until all that remained was the neck of the bottle and the reeds covering it. A rock with blood upon it was also found near the dead Indian which had the appearance of having been used to beat the him over the head.

It is said that not over half an hour previous to the finding of the dead Indian, Stikona and another Indian known as Corbet Holt were seen to leave town together with a demijohn in their possession, and another report says that they were seen wrangling while going up the hill north of town.

A. P. Clark, who lives north of town, was coming to Madras and saw a man riding rapidly toward him but the man turned out of the road where it is not inclosed and rode past Mr. Clark probably 100 yards distant, apparently wishing to escape identification, but Clark could see that the man on horseback was an Indian, and continuing toward town found Stikona lying in the road dead, as above stated.

The Indian on horseback shortly after passing Mr. Clark turned directly toward the Deschutes river, going through the wire fences on the way there and swam the river with his horse. Holt was found at his home Wednesday morning by Ben Holladay, reservation policeman, and Peter Kilauna, and was brought to town without resistance. He admitted having been drunk the day before, but denied being in the company of Stikona, and disclaimed any knowledge of the demijohn or any remembrance of how he crossed the river. When brought before Justice Frank J. Brooks, Corbet Holt waived preliminary examination and was taken to the county jail yesterday afternoon by Constable J. D. Mayes and John Palmehn.

A. P. Clark, Dr. W. H. Snook and Ira Barber were witnesses before the justice's jury. Clark gave substantially the testimony related above. Dr. Snook testified as to the nature of the wounds which caused Stikona's death. The findings of the jury follow: We, the jury empaneled by Frank J. Brooks, J. P., to inquire into the cause of the death of Jim Stikona, do find that Jim Stikona came to his death by foul means from unknown hands.

The remains of the deceased Indian were taken to the Agency Tuesday. There was a rumor that Holt had concluded to confess the murder and throw himself upon the mercy of the court, but this has not been substantiated. Court does not convene until next October.
