This is the first rural mail route to be established in Crooked county, and is the strongest possible proof of the rapid increase of population in this section of country. Only a very few years ago this same territory was grazed by stock, and a few families, scattered here and there throughout this region now traversed by a rural mail route, made up the entire population. With its present rapid settlement and development, it will not be long before this portion of the county will be one of the most densely settled portions of Eastern Oregon, as it is already the most numerously populated portion of Crooked county.

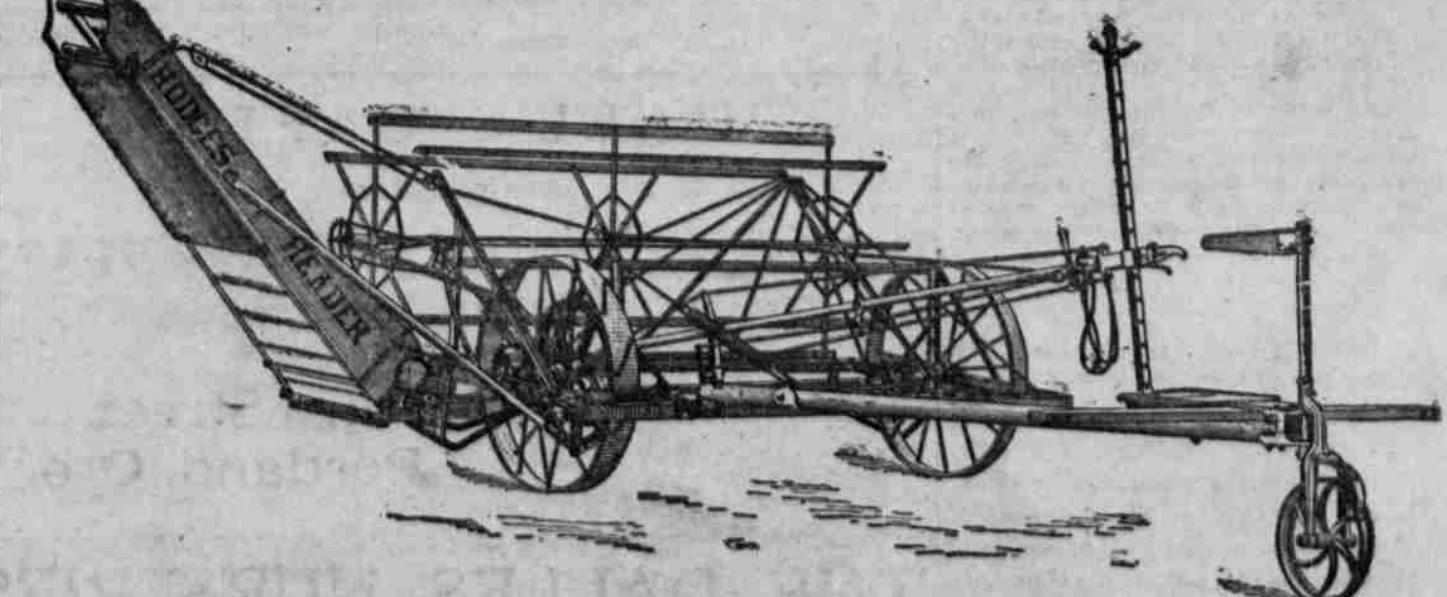
