Digging a Town Well.

The water question has been taken up by the business men of Madras and another well is being put down just south of Mr. Isham's which is expected to relieve the shortage of water during the summer months. The well when completed will be over eight feet in diameter at the bottom and will be sunk as deep as the flowing in of the water will allow. A new pump has been ordered which will lift over 300 gallons per hour, and it will be installed as soon as it arrives.

The wells already in town have furnished plenty of water in ordinary seasons, but the hot weather of the last two weeks has greatly increased the amount of water used on the plains around Madras, so that very near every day for the past two weeks there has been from eight to 20 wagons waiting for water from early in the morning to late in the evening. This move of the citizens is to be commended and it is hoped their effort to relieve the water situation will be realized.

CONTEST NOTICE.

A sufficient contest affidavit having been filed in this office by Warren E. Mills, contestant, against homestead entry No. 10,646, made April 9, 1882, for so 14 sec 20, tp 10 s, r 18 e, w. n. by Presley A. Chrisman, (deceased) contestee, in which it is alleged that said entryman died on April 27, 1904, and was at such date a single man; that for more than six months following his heirs totally failed to either cultivate or reside upon such claim and had abandoned the same for more than six months and that said failures continued until after knowledge of contest filed herein by contestant on October 29, 1904, when J. R. Chrisman, one of the heirs residing at Lagonda, Missouri, made some pretense at cultivation of said place and has since offered proof thereon; that the heirs of said Presley A. Chrisman, deceased, are Mrs. Chrisman, mother, Lyda Chrisman, J. R. Chrisman, Martha Smith, Luther Chrisman, G. M. Chrisman, John Reynolds, James Reynolds, Etta Reynolds, Emma Reynolds and David Chrisman; that said alleged absence from the land and failure to cultivate, graze or improve the said lands during the more than six months following the death of the entryman and until after date of filing contest herein was not due to the employment of any of said heirs in the army, navy, or marine corps of the United States in time of war.

Said parties are hereby notified to appear and respond and offer evidence touching said allegation at 10 o'clock A. M. on August 14, 1905, before Don P. Rea, a U. S. Commissioner, at his office in Madras, Oregon, and that final hearing will be held at 10 o'clock A. M. on August 21, 1905, before the Register and Receiver at the United States Land Office in The Dalles, Oregon.
The said contestant having, in a proper affidavit filed June 7, 1905, set forth facts which show that, after due diligence, personal service of this notice cannot be made, it is hereby ordered and directed that such notice be given by due and proper publication.
