Rev. G. M. Booth, presiding elder of the Methodist Episcopal church for the Columbia River district, died at his home at The Dalles on Monday, July 11, 1905 His death came very suddenly while he was alone in a room at his home, his during the morning, and feeling ill, had been driven up home in a friend's buggy. A doctor called later, and later in the afternoon his wife left the room for just a moment and when she returned, found Mr. Booth lying on his face, dead. Death was due to heart disease, from which he was known to be suffering. He had planned taking a vacation in a few days and had been granted a respite from duty

The Rev. George M. Booth was one of the best known and most beloved ministers in Eastern Oregon. Three years ago he was assigned to The Dalles district, as C. P.
