END OF THE FAIR.

Sunday will be the last day of the Lewis and Clark Exposition, the greatest fair ever held on the Pacific Coast. The attendance has been about two and a half millions, fully two-thirds of which were paid admissions. Financially the exposition has been a great success, the announcement having been made by President Good that fully \$100,000 will be returned to the subscribers. At the time the subscription for stock was taken, \$400,000 was raised in Portland, and it was not expected that any of it would be returned. About 25 per cent will, however, be returned to the subscribers.

From an educational standpoint the exposition has done great work. Too little was known in other parts of the United States concerning the wonderful advantages of soil and climate which Nature has bestowed with such a lavish hand upon the Pacific Northwest, and the Lewis and Clark Exposition has drawn the attention of the entire country to this much favored section. Its benefits will be felt immediately, and the state is unquestionably entering upon an era of growth and development such as it has never before known.

Unmistakable signs of the approach of winter are already in evidence and the prospects for a long seige of cold weather are said by the older settlers of this region to be unusually good. Heavy frosts cover the ground every morning, and occasionally a covering of snow may be seen upon the surrounding hills. Last Saturday morning old Grizzly and Grey Butte both had on winter attire, and the long chain of snow-capped mountains to the westward show their covering of new snow. During the summer these mountains were more nearly bare of snow than they were ever known to have been before, but from present indications this winter will make up for all the delinquencies of last season in its supply of a snowy covering. The mornings and evenings are already very chilly, which is quite unusual in this region, where the most pleasant days of the year are during the long fall season.

The establishment of a rural free delivery at Culver will emphasize the fact of the very rapid settlement of this section of Crook county during the past few years. It requires 100 families upon a route of not to exceed 25 miles before a petition for a rural free delivery route will be considered, and the Culver route, if established, will be the second which has been allowed in this section of the county. And, they will be the only free delivery routes in Crook county, indicating the wonderful development and settlement of a country which was only a few years ago given over entirely to the pasturage of the flocks and herds of a few scattered stockmen.

FLOURING MILL STARTS UP.

"Madras Flour Out of Madras Wheat"

The new flouring mill of the Madras Milling & Mercantile Co. was started up during the week and will soon be grinding out flour regularly, although some delay is being experienced just now in getting things to working properly. The engine was fired up last week for the purpose of testing the machinery, and on Monday of this week the grain was started on its journey to the rollers, so as to be converted into flour. Owing to some minor troubles with the pumping machinery there is a slight delay in getting the mill into perfect working order, but within a few days the "tightening up" process will be over with and then the mill will begin to grind steadily.

The new flouring mill has a capacity of 50 barrels of flour per day. Max Putz, the secretary of the company, is an experienced miller, and in fact has the reputation of being one of the best millers in Eastern Oregon. He operated a mill at Mitchell for several years, and then moved his mill to this place. Under his management the mill at this place should

We, the undersigned, your petitioners, respectfully represent unto your Honorable Body that we are qualified electors of Crook County and the State of Oregon, residing in the territory hereinafter set forth and described, to-wit: the SW 1/4 SW 1/4 of section one (1), the SW 1/4 SW 1/4 of section two (2), the N 1/2 SW 1/4 of section eleven (11) and the SW 1/4 of section twelve (12), all in Township eleven (11) South of Range thirteen (13) East Willamette Meridian, and that we are now residing within the limits of said described territory, not less than one hundred and fifty inhabitants.

Wherefore your petitioners respectfully pray that the said described territory, to-wit, the SW 1/4 SW 1/4 section 1, SW 1/4 SW 1/4 section 2, N 1/2 SW 1/4 section 11 and SW 1/4 section 12, township 11 S., range 13 E., W. M., may be incorporated into a municipal corporation to be known as the Town of Madras, as is provided for by Chapter One of Title 27 of Beallinger & Cotton's Annotated Code of Oregon.

And your petitioners further respectfully pray for such other and further orders of this Court as your Honorable Body may find necessary in the premises.

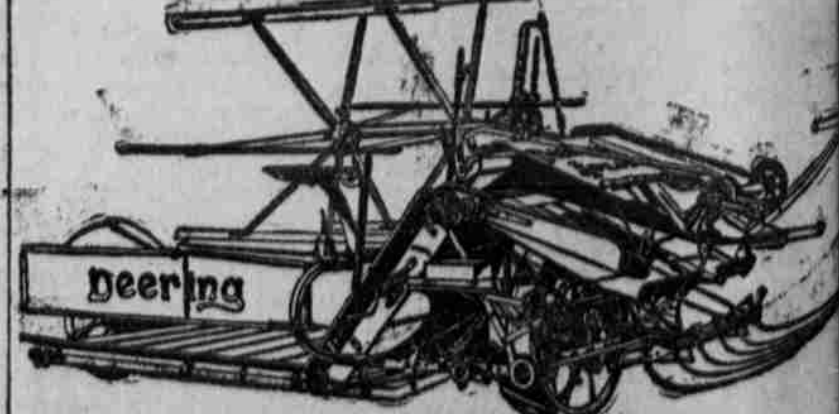
