BURTON AGAIN INDICTED

Senator J. R. Burton of Kan sas has been again found guilty upon six counts of the indictment charging him with accepting compensation from a St Louis corporation for services performed before the Postoffie Department while he was a senator of the United States. He was convicted upon the former trial of the charge, but the Su preme Court remanded the case for a new trial. The penalty for the offense is a severe one, the maximum being a fine of \$10,000 and two years imprisonment for each offense, and the convicted forfeiting forever the right to hold any position of trust or profit under the United States Government.

BIG BOOM AT ONTARIO

A big boom is reported to be in progress at Ontario, as a result of the prospects of that place being the terminus of the O. R. & N. tine across Central Oregon, and as a result, real estate in that locality, especially town lots, are changing hands rapidly. It is reported that 200 lots changed hands in one day. It is believed at Ontario that the road from Nation to that place, across Central Oregon, will ce ainly be built at once, and the machine shops of the company will then be moved from Huntington to Ontario, in which event the town with immediately become a point of some importance commercially in that section of the state. The townsite of Ontario has been extended in a sort of panhandle along the proposed route of the railroad, and a number of new lots thus created, the new lots finding ready marke among the enthusiastic residents of the town.
