

The suit of the State against the Warner Valley Stock Company, now pending before the Supreme Court, is of more than oridinary importance. While there is only 4640 acres of land Involved in the suit, the title to 78.901 acres will be determined by the result.

The case is before the Supreme Court on appeal from a ruling of Judge Benson, of the First Judicial District who sustained the demurrer of the defendants to the complaint on the and an evident, studied desire ground that the state was not a party to the action, and further that the statute of limitations was a bar to any action questioning the title of the subject the lessee to endless company to the land.

The land is located in the Warner Lake Valley, one of the richest stockraising sections of the state. Title to the land was obtained by the company by reason of the swamp land act of Congress donating all swamp lands to the state. The claim was made in the name of the state in behalf of the company, and the patent was issued by the United States direct to the company.

The state now claims that the company obtained the title by means of fraudulent representations; that much of the land is not swamp land, and that the state's claim was not a valid claim at the time the patent was issued. If this suit results in favor of the state it will eventually throw open to settlement about 100,000 acres of the finest hay and grazing land in the state.
