## A BUSINESS PROPOSITION.

Hon. E. L. Smith of Hood River, whose friends throughout the state urged him to run for the gubernatorial nomination because they believed that he was pre-eminently the man to lead the republican forces to victory, is going to prove an equally strong candidate for the United States Senatorship, for which office he has announced himself. No man in the state has been more closely identified with the state's development during the past 30 years, and none knows better than he her present needs. In his capacity as president of the Oregon Development League, Mr. Smith has been closely in touch with the forces now directed toward the exploitation and development of the country "where rolls the Oregon." His election to the Senate would not only be a just reward to a man who has given a good many of the best efforts of his life to the advancement of his state's interests, but it would place him in a position where he could continue those efforts to the greatest advantage of his state. There would be less "politics" and more good business sense in the election of E. L. Smith to the United States Senate than any other candidate who has yet been named.

## THE CO-OPERATIVE PLAN.

There is a strong demand for his nomination, however, from this section of the county, and his candidacy is unquestionably gaining ground

in other sections. There seems to be a growing sentiment throughout the county in favor of giving Western Crook county representation upon the county board, and Mr. Fisher's well known qualifications for the office are gaining his candidacy many friends.

A. Bennett, known as the Mark Twain of Oregon, and whose "Rabbitville Items" have made his paper, the Irrigon Irrigator, one of the widest read country weeklies of the state, has sold his newspaper to C. C. Hutchinson of irrigation fame. We'll miss the "Bunco House," the "Butterbottom gal" and those soothing "perscriptions" obtainable at the "City Drug Store," when we are reading over our exchanges.

William Johnson, a candidate for the Republican nomination for the office of county clerk, was in town several days last week meeting the voters of this precinct. Mr. Johnson is one of the old residents in this county and has a wide acquaintance in most of the precincts. He was for six years a deputy in the office of the sheriff of this county. Mr. Johnson's announcement appears in another column.

The political pot continues to boil, and this week has added another to the list of democratic candidates, although the republicans appear to be "all up." Roscoe W. Bell of this place has announced his candidacy for the democratic nomination for county surveyor, and he enjoys the distinction of being the first democratic candidate Madras has produced. Mr. Bell is a young man, unquestionably competent, and his democratic affiliations are the worst thing his republican friends know against him.

About four inches of snow fell Sunday night, and as the ground was not frozen and the weather which succeeded the storm melted the snow slowly, another fine lot of moisture has been added to the supply which is being conserved for the use of the growing crops this spring.

W. F. Hammer, candidate for the democratic nomination for county clerk, was in town yesterday, giving the glad hand to the voters of this precinct. Mr. Hammer is making a thorough canvass of the county before the primaries.
