The fact that this great development in Western Crook county entitles us to representation upon the county board is conceded by all who are fair minded and just, and there is a determined effort in both ends of Western Crook to elect a county commissioner. But, the further fact that there is a candidate seeking the democratic nomination for county commissioner, and that he is a "Prineville man"—that is, his interests all center at the county seat—is pretty strong indication that Western Crook county is not going to be permitted to have the county commissioner without a struggle.

A COMPLEX CANDIDATE.

Jonathan Bourne, Jr., is truly a many-sided politician. The last time he came into political prominence he was maintaining "headquarters" at Salem, spending thousands of dollars in an effort to debauch and corrupt the representatives of the people in the state legislature, to the end that he might "control" the election of the United States Senator. The part that Bourne played in the "hold-up session" of the legislature is one of the shadiest bits of Oregon political history. And now, the passage of the direct primary law having been a direct blow at corrupt machine methods in politics, Jonathan Bourne, Jr., appears in a new role, posing as a champion of the people.

The purpose of the direct primary law is to secure a free and uninfluenced expression of choice by the people. Jonathan Bourne, Jr., who aspires to be the republican choice for United States Senator, is doing more to prevent and hinder a free and uninfluenced expression than any other man in the state. With the assistance of a corps of trained politicians of the same stripe as himself, he is sending out quantities of literature and letters to the voters in the rural districts, holding himself up as the only original and Simon-pure friend of the people, the "champion of statement number one." At the same time, by the judicious distribution of fat morsels of advertising throughout the entire state, he has succeeded in muzzling most of the country newspapers and preventing them from telling about his past record.

If Bourne has ever done anything to entitle him to the confidence and support of the voters of the state, why doesn't he point it out? Why doesn't he point to some especial qualification, something that fits him for the high office of a United States Senator? It is seemly in any candidate asking an endorsement for the highest office in the gift of the people of his state, to point to some accomplishment in the cause of the people. Past accomplishment, together with a clean public and private record, is the only guarantee the people can have for the future. And Bourne has none of these.
