This will give voters residing out of Madras an opportunity to get in a good long morning's work, and then get in to the polls to vote in the afternoon. This is a duty you owe to this end of the county, and no voter in this precinct should fail to come in and vote during the afternoon.

THE RAILROAD.

The railroad news of this week has the ring of truth to it, and it now seems not only probable but quite certain that the much needed transportation facilities for this section of Oregon will be forthcoming at once. Not only is there much promise for the future to be derived from Mr. Nelson's methods of railroad building in the past, but the fact that his representatives are here securing right-of-way for the line and are willing for these right-of-way contracts to contain a clause whereby title reverts to the grantor unless actual construction on the Deschutes road is begun within a limited period, is an additional guarantee of their intention to build at once.

A railroad from any direction would have been a boon for this community, but no other road could promise as much as does the road up the Deschutes and the Willow Creek gorge. Not only is the Deschutes road the most practical because the most economical to operate and therefore the cheapest road for the shipper as well, but this road will be the most direct to the markets for our product, of any of the roads projected into Central Oregon. Mr. Gordon is meeting with much encouragement and the most liberal treatment from those across whose lands he is asking a right-of-way. In this immediate section the right-of-way is being donated, the deeds reciting merely a nominal consideration.

A DUTY YOU OWE.

Don't forget that it is your duty to go to the primaries tomorrow (Friday) and help to nominate good men for all of the offices to be filled—county, state and national. The direct primary law takes out of the hands of scheming politicians the power to manipulate the nominations to their own private ends, and places in the hands of the people the right to choose for themselves. Each voter has a voice in the naming of his party's candidates, from the highest to the lowest, and it is a privilege which should be exercised. The direct primary

law is on trial, and it should be given a fair test. If you keep away from the primaries because you have no interest in politics, you are turning over to those who make politics a business the privilege of naming the candidates for the various offices to be filled, and the primary law is a failure. If you are a good citizen you have an interest in helping to nominate the best men for office, and it is a duty you owe yourself and your community.

In this community the duty imposed upon you has additional significance of a local nature. This end of the county has long wanted representation upon the county board, in order that fair and impartial consideration might be given to all petitions from this end of the county presented to the county court. With this end in view Fred Fisher was prevailed upon to run for county commissioner. He is qualified in every way to make us an excellent commissioner, and every man who is interested in the matter of getting representation for this end of the county upon the county court, should make it a point to go to the primaries next Friday afternoon, and vote for Fred Fisher. If the republican voters in this end of the county will stand together and give him a solid vote, his nomination is certain, and election will follow in June. Fisher's election will give us representation upon the county board for four years, so you can't afford to stay away from the primaries because of some work you had planned to do on that day. You had better lose the afternoon's work than to lose the opportunity to get representation upon the county court, so important to this growing section. The primaries will be held from noon until seven o'clock p. m. tomorrow (Friday).
