The republicans of Oregon have nominated Jonathan Bourne, Jr., for United States senator. It will be gratifying to the people of Crook county, however, to know that they had no hand in this. In this county the vote on United States senator resulted in a victory for Hon. E. L. Smith, of Hood River, his majority over Bourne being 49. The vote in the county was: Jonathan Bourne 242, H. M. Calk 92, Stephen A. Lowell 75, E. L. Smith 291, E. B. Watson 29.

Judge Calk, of Portland, candidate for the republican nomination for United States senator, was given an illustration of the old expression "His Calk was all dough," when the returns from the late primaries came in from the rural districts. When the results became known in the populous centers it looked like a certain victory for Judge Calk, and his nomination was announced by the daily papers of the state. Two or three days later, when the returns began to arrive from the rural districts where Bourne had muzzled the country newspapers and without interruption won over the voters by his "heart to heart" talks, it was evident that his bar'l campaign had won. Bourne won out by a majority of a few hundred votes. The price was not made public.

### INCORPORATION.

Another attempt will be made to incorporate Madras within the next month or so, probably in time to get the petition before the next meeting of the county court, which will be the first week in July. The prospects are bright for the rapid growth of the town during the coming summer, and if railroad construction up the Deschutes begins as scheduled, the growth of the town will take on boom proportions. Incorporation is necessary, not only for the purposes of proper police regulation of the community, but because there is much that should be done in the way of providing water, light and other requisites of a healthful and prosperous community life. The matter of paramount importance to Madras and the surrounding country is the water question. Its solution is only possible through the organized effort of the community, and this seems impossible of accomplishment without incorporation. The proper sanitation of the community is also a most important reason for incorporation. These reasons were urged last fall, when incorporation was sought, but the county court turned down the petition for reasons which, to them, were sufficient. The importance of the matter of incorporation increases in proportion to the growth of the town.

Recently there has been some discussion of the question of putting water upon Agency Plains, by pumping it up from the Deschutes river near the Cowles sawmill, where the plains lie almost perpendicularly above the river. The plan appears practical, although the details have not been worked out as yet. Once pumped up on to the plains, it would be an easy matter to supply the town of Madras with plenty of water, and if the town were incorporated so that it might contract for water from this source if found to be practicable, it would afford an additional incentive to take up the project of pumping the water up from the Deschutes.

Every citizen who is interested in the welfare of Madras or in the solution of the water question for this locality, should lend his support to the movement for incorporation.

### THRESHING COMPANY ORGANIZED.

The Christian Union Threshing Co. was organized at Opal prairie this week. The object is to do general grain threshing and, in time, well drilling. Articles of incorporation will be filed immediately. Ten prominent men are interested in the concern. The officers are: E. G. Gray, president; H. L. Evans, secretary; C. A. Whitsett, treasurer. The company has just purchased a large, up-to-date Case threshing outfit from McTaggart & Bye. The traction wheels of the engine will be 36 inches by 6 feet. The separator will be steel frame.
