OPPOSE EQUAL SUFFRAGE

Portland Business Men Believe It Injurious to Welfare of State.

In these days when the spirit of a greater Oregon is in the air the state can ill afford to assume the handicap of woman suffrage. Most people think that there is no danger of it passing, but when it is considered that six years ago it only failed by a scant 2000 votes in the entire state, and that at that time the woman suffragists had no money, while today they have a campaign fund of more than \$10,000 and have 12 speakers imported from other states campaigning through Oregon, the danger will become apparent.

So serious does the danger appear to the business men of Portland that more than 200 of them recently published a protest against woman suffrage over their own signatures. The list as published contained the name of practically every commercial interest, manufacturing and industrial, contained in the state of Oregon. The men who signed this protest represent all walks of life and all political parties. They are not politicians in any sense of the word. They are certainly typical of the brains of the state, and a protest from them is certainly worth a careful consideration of every citizen.
