AT MADRAS ON THE FOURTH OF JULY

Committees Rapidly Materializing
Plans For A Most Successful
Celebration of The Day.

A meeting was held at the school house last Thursday evening for the purpose of making arrangements for a big Fourth of July celebration at Madras, preparations for which are now well under way. Committees have been appointed as follows:

It is planned to have appropriate exercises in the morning, consisting of an address and a musical program; games and sports in the afternoon; with fireworks and a big dance in the evening. Ample provision will be made for shade and tables for those who care to bring a basket lunch, and no pains will be spared to make the day pleasant for our visitors on that day.

WILL PLAY BALL

Game Between Prineville and Madras
At This Place Next Sunday.

The Madras and Prineville ball teams will cross bats at this place next Sunday afternoon, in the first game of the season between these two teams. This is the first game that Madras has played this year, and will be a try-out for the players, several of whom are new men on the team. The team has been crippled by the loss of C. A. Riddle, who injured his hand in a practice game some time ago, a metacarpal bone of his left hand having been broken, and by reason of which injury he will be unable to play in the game.

Prineville has played four games this season with Redmond, and has won all four of them, giving her quite a lead for the championship of Crook county. Bend will also be an aspirant for championship honors, and will no doubt put a strong team in the field. Last year there was a very lively rivalry between Bend and Prineville for the championship.

The local team has arranged to entertain the visiting team by a big dance on next Saturday evening, at the Madras Milling Company's store building, which they have rented from A. C. Sanford for the occasion.

WILL MOVE STORE BUILDING

Ed Harbin, of Prineville, has been in town during the past week. Mr. Harbin will have charge of the job of moving the store building recently purchased by Mr. Sanford, from its present location, to its new site on the Sanford lot opposite J. W. & M. A. Robinson & Co.

The task of moving this building will be a much more difficult one than might be supposed, and requires great care to avoid wrenching or straining the building. It will also require nearly 10,000 feet of lumber, in large timbers to be placed under the building. To give some idea of the size of the timbers required, two of the sticks will be 70 feet long and 12x14 inches in dimension. Mr. Harbin has been engaged in the business of moving houses for a number of years, and he expects to have this building on the Sanford lot and ready for occupancy not later than July 1st.

SPECIMENS OF GROWING GRAINS

G. R. Graham, who lives — miles southwest of Madras, brought in some fine specimens of this year's grain, last Friday morning. Among them was a specimen of Little Club wheat on which there was over a hundred stalks to one stool, and all headed out fluely. A specimen of rye stood over six feet in height, and there were also fine specimens of beardless barley and other grain. They were all grown on Mr. Graham's homestead.

SMALLPOX IN SHERMAN AND KLAMATH

Several cases of smallpox are reported from Wasco in Sherman county, and a number of cases are also reported from Klamath Falls. Every precaution is being taken to isolate the known cases of smallpox, and those who have

come in contact with it will be quarantined. Another case is also reported in Langell valley.

Those who remember the fatal smallpox epidemic which prevailed at Prineville and Shaniko and other small towns in this section of the state about three years ago, will most earnestly hope that we are not to have a repetition of those dreadful days.

ELKINS ELECTED

After a nerve-racking finish that left the result of the race for sheriff in doubt for several days, Frank Elkins was found to be the winner by a majority of seven over his competitor, Jacob Stroud. An error discovered in the Ashwood returns turned into victory what had appeared to be certain defeat. The Elkins majority at Ashwood had been set down as 23, whereas it was really 32, a difference of nine, which was just enough to change the result of the election. The race was one of the closest ever run in the county. Two years ago Elkins was defeated by only three votes.

GOVERNOR WILL VISIT

COMING TO CROOK COUNTY NEXT WEEK

He Will Attend The Bend Farmers' Meeting And Make An Address To The People.

Governor Chamberlain has notified parties at Bend that he will be there on Tuesday, June 19th, and that the other members of the state land board will probably accompany him. The visit of the state land board is for the purpose of examining some of the segregations of the Deschutes Irrigation & Power Company in that locality for which patent is desired, and also to look over other irrigation projects in that vicinity.

An invitation has also been extended to the Governor to address the Farmers' Institute, which will be held at Bend on that date. This meeting of the farmers was to have been held a month or so ago, but was postponed to await the pleasure of Governor Chamberlain, who was busy with the campaign at that time, and who was desired as a speaker at the meeting. A large number of farmers from different sections of Crook county, are expected to be present at this meeting, which will be one of the most successful ever held in Crook county.
