Frank Elkins and Ed Harbin, Prineville, were in town several days of the week. They came over on their way to the Elkins ranch, where they overhauled the threshing outfit belonging to Mr. Elkins, and which is in good shape for use this season. They returned to Prineville the first of the week.

Come Prairie, which lies along the Deschutes and is covered with a fine growth of native grass that can be cut for hay and is attracting the attention of the land seeker, since the recent act of Congress which permits entries upon agricultural lands in forest reserves, these prairie lands are well watered and produce a ton or more of hay per acre, without any cultivation whatever. They lie close to the mountains, and the land finds a ready market.

The large traction engine and threshing machine belonging to the Union Threshing Company reached Madras on Saturday evening, after a slow trip from Shaniko. In many places the road had to be built up in order to get the engine and machine to pass, and this took considerable time. The engine was manufactured by the J. I. Case Company and was placed through McCarty & Bye of this place. I. A. Russell, one of the company's representatives, set the machine up and ran the engine out this far.

When the big traction engine came to the town and blowing into Madras late in the evening, with headlight glowing and whistle sounding for every crossing, it looked quite like the real thing, and it could almost imagine that W. F. Nelson's Oregon Trunk Line had stolen the engine and slipped in unawares.

Nelson's road, by the way, is building right ahead, increasing the working distance from day to day as laborers become available, and from the road traction engine to today the railroad locomotive crossing over the Oregon Trunk Line up the Deschutes, may not be such a far cry from all.

John F. Corwin, whose ranch lies about a mile from the old Haystack post office, is one of the farmers of this section who is not complaining about his crop this year. On about 65 acres of wheat he has threshed in the neighborhood of 20 bushels to the acre, and the grain is said to be of a good grade. A few days ago he offered 75 cents per bushel for all the wheat that he could spare, but he would not sell at that price. At this time the price, which promises to be an exceptionally strong one, Mr. Corwin's crop is not much more than any crop he has had in the seven years of his residence on the place. There are other good crops in this section, too, and the opening of the harvesting is demonstrating the fact that the crops are generally in much better condition than was at first supposed.


