NEW GOLD EXCITEMENT

Rich Strike Just Made in Lake County.

ORE IS FABULOUSLY RICH

Has Caused Stampede to New District--Resembles the Famous Tonopah District in Nevada.

The biggest mining boom of recent years in this state is stampeding hundreds of people to the new find in Lake county, where fabulously rich ore has just been discovered. It is claimed that the ore taken from the newly discovered mines closely resembles the ore from the famous Tonopah district in Nevada, and the formation and lay of the country are also identical. The ores run high in free gold, ranging from \$200 to \$5000 per ton, and some of the ore is so rich that the free gold can be seen with the naked eye.

The newly discovered mining district lies about 25 miles northeast of Lakeview, in Coyote Hills. People are flocking there in wagon loads, a majority of them coming up from northern California, although many are going from all sides. A Lakeview paper makes the prediction that 50,000 people will be attracted to that district by the new gold strike within the next six months. Claims are being staked out for miles around the original discovery, and new finds are being reported every day. The ravines are being located as placer mines, and in some of them it is claimed the dirt averages \$8 to the pan. One report says that a body of book leaf ore has been discovered that will assay \$50,000 per ton.

BRUIN VISITS BIG PLAIN

Big Brown Bear Killed By Ranchers.

A big brown bear weighing probably about 300 pounds was killed on Agency Plains last Sunday by Charles Dillon and Alfred Parkey, who shot him with a 22-calibre rifle. While big game hunters are scouring the mountains in the upper Deschutes and around the berry patches on the Santiam and McKenzie Rivers, two lucky ranchers on the plains can tell a story of big game hunting here at home, which will doubtless discount any stories of the chase that may be brought home from the mountains.

At Alf Parkey's homestead last Sunday, Charles Dillon and Parkey noticed a large animal crossing the Parkey field with a lumbering gait, and the animal was soon identified by them as a bear. They only had a small calibre rifle in the house, but mounting their horses they gave chase, and riding around Bruin, shot him with the 22 rifle and killed him. He was a monster brown bear, weighing possibly 300 pounds or more, and when he stood on his hind legs he was as tall as a man.

Agency Plains is a populous farming community, and that Bruin should venture to cross it as he would his native wilds was, in the opinion of the ranchers on the plains, justly punished by death. This is probably the first bear that has crossed the plains in a quarter

of a century or longer. His presence there can only be explained by the supposition that he was driven out of his haunts in the mountains by forest fires, and seeking new stamping grounds, crossed the Deschutes and climbed the high rimrocks to the plains above.

THE LAND FRAUD TRIALS

Blue Mountain Reserve Case Unsettled.
 F. Mays, W. N. Jones and George Sorenson are Defendants.

The trial of F. P. Mays, W. N. Jones and George Sorenson on a charge of conspiracy to defraud the Government out of large tracts of valuable timber lands has been in progress in the federal court at Portland during the past week, and is attracting wide attention owing to the scope of the operations undertaken by the defendants. They are charged with having fraudulently acquired title to over 200,000 acres of school lands lying within the territory which was afterwards to be created into the Blue Mountain Forest Reserve, and which their prior knowledge of where the lines would be made possible. These lands so acquired were, when the reserve should be created, to be exchanged with the Government for "scrip" which could be placed upon the most valuable vacant timber lands the Government owned. The scrip they would get was easily worth \$6 an acre in the open market, and as the school lands which they were to exchange for it only cost them \$1.25 per acre, their profit in the transaction would have been \$4.75 per acre. Through the efforts of Secretary of the Interior Hitchcock, however, the scheme was nipped in the bud, as the reserve was not created until after the lien land law was repealed, and so all of the school land holdings in the reserve were valueless for scrip.

Although this indictment was returned by a federal grand jury over 18 months ago, the defendants have not been brought to trial earlier owing to the condition of one of the defendants, F. P. Mays, who suffered a physical collapse when the exposure and indictment occurred. At the instance of the Government he was recently examined by physicians, who pronounced him in fit condition to stand trial, and the case was then set. Although the defendants are represented by a brilliant array of counsel, it is believed that Special Prosecutor Heney and District Attorney Bristol will add another victory to the long list they have already scored in the land fraud trials. Much damaging evidence has been brought out, the most convincing being that of C. E. S. Wood, a prominent attorney of Portland who represents the road company, who testified in effect that Mays asked him to go into the deal.

Rev. John G. Moehring left on Monday for Spokane, where he goes to attend the conference of the German Methodist Church for this conference district. Mr. Moehring's many friends in this locality will hope that he may be returned to his charge at Methodist Hill, to continue the good work which he began here a year ago.

William Boegli was in town last Friday from The Cove on Crooked River, marketing a load of fresh tomatoes. These were the first tomatoes in any quantity which have been sold here this year, although a few earlier ones were brought in by others. The first seen here this season came from the ranch of John T. Disney on the Deschutes.

N. H. Pinkerton and M. C. Mason have been appointed by Governor Chamberlain as delegates to the Irrigation Congress which meets in Boise, Idaho, on September 3. Mr. Mason will not attend, but Mr. Pinkerton may do so, in which event he will leave here Saturday.

E. C. Goodwin of The Dalles visited Max Lueddemann in Madras for several days this week. He was accompanied by his nephew, James Gillespie, of Wichita, Kansas, who is spending the winter in The Dalles.
