Entered The Girls' Dormitory At Warmspring with felonious Intent.

James Palmer, a Warmspring Indian, was arrested at the Agency last Monday on a charge of breaking into and entering the dormitory of the Indian school at that place, with a felonious intent, and was brought before United States Commissioner Rea for a preliminar hearing. The Indian waived examination, and was turned over to Deputy U. S. Marshall Bushee, to be taken to Portland where he will be given a trial in the federal court.

Palmer confesses to having broken into the dormitory where there are forty or fifty Indian girls, a number of times. He made his entrance through a small window, which appeared too small to admit the body of even a small boy but which the Indian managed to squeeze through. There was no way of opening this window, which only had one glass in it, and so Palmer cut the putty away with his knife and then removed the glass. In order to reach the window he had to climb a tall, slim post, and the Indian policeman who watched for him and finally caught him, says that he climbed it with as much agility as a cat. Palmer will undoubtedly plead guitty at his trial in the federal court, and will be sentenced to a term of imprisonment.

Superintendent Covey, of the Warmspring Reservation, pushed the prosecution of Palmer in order to make an example of doing a good business .- Bee. him at the reservation. When it was discovered that Palmer was entering the dormitory at night, Mr. Covey set a watch for him, and succeeded in catch inp him as he was entering the building. A complaint was sworn to, and the Indian is now in the hands of the federal authorities.
