PRACTICAL RESULTS

Scientific soil culture is feasible, practical, inexpensive and profitable. A volume of testimony might be given. A few small bits of evidence are here given.

On the Burlington farm in Nebrasks, 228 acres under cultivation were cared for in 1904, 1905 and 1906 by two men and 9 horses except in harvest time, when extra help was employed. Net profit on this farm in 1905 was over \$4000, or \$11.76 per acre on the entire acreage of 340 in crops, meadow and pasture.

On the Pomeroy farm in Kansas 200 acres were handled for 3 years with only 2 men and 7 horses except in MADRAS,
