WAS NOT STREET'S BODY

Yesterday two Indians who had been fishing about a mile above Seufert's cannery, came down to where Arthur Seufert and some workmen were fixing a cable near the cannery, and said they had seen the body of a white man in the river but could not get hold of it. They explained how the body looked, and their story is not doubted, though the men further down saw nothing of it. It was suggested that it might be the body of Homer Street, which was thrown into the Matoles by dynamite some weeks ago and for which a reward is offered. If so, it is to be hoped it will be found, as it will be necessary to produce the body before insurance can be collected.—The Dalles Chronicle.

The body seen by the Indians in the Columbia River above The Dalles was later found at Cook's Landing, and was identified as that of August Williamson, a workman employed on the Northbank road, who had been drowned accidentally about a month ago.

Street's body has not yet been found, although a diligent search has been kept up along the Matoles, where it is believed to have caught upon some of the submerged snags along the banks of that stream.

DEATH OF ANNIE BROGAN

Annie, a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Brogan of Antelope, died at her home at that place last Monday after an illness of some months. She recently spent a month or more at this place, and only two weeks ago returned to her home at Antelope. At that time her

condition had become so alarming that it was thought advisable to carry her to Portland for additional medical treatment, but her case was there pronounced hopeless and she was again taken home, a few days prior to her death. She was a sister of Mrs. J. C. Robinson of this place, who went to Antelope last Monday morning, upon learning of her sister's serious condition, arriving there a few hours prior to her death. The deceased was about 15 years of age, and was a gentle, lovable girl, whose death will be sincerely mourned by her family and friends. The remains were conveyed to The Dalles yesterday for interment in the Catholic cemetery at that place.

TWO TONS PASS OVER CHEST

Silver Lake, Or., May 20.—Joe Sumner, of Powell Buttes, a brother of Tom Sumner, Corbett's stage agent at Shaniko, was the victim of what may prove a fatal accident last Saturday morning near the Vandeventer place at Powell Buttes. Mr. Sumner was thrown from a freight wagon, which he was driving, and the wagon, loaded with 4000 pounds of baled hay, passed over his chest. When he was picked up he was alive and could talk. He was removed to his home in Prineville, where he has lived for over 20 years. He is the son of J. C. Sumner, at one time Judge of Crook County.

NOTICE OF RESTORATION OF PUBLIC LANDS TO SETTLEMENT AND ENTRY. Department of the Interior, General Land Office, Washington, D. C., May 11, 1907. Notice is hereby given that the vacant public lands in the following described areas, temporarily withdrawn on October 20 and December 10, 1900, and January 18, 1906, for proposed additions to the Cascade National Forest, Oregon, and not otherwise withdrawn, reserved or appropriated, will by authority of the Secretary of the Interior be restored to the public domain on July 27, 1907, and become subject to settlement on and after that date, but not to entry, filing and selection until on and after August 26, 1907, under the usual restrictions at the United States Land Office at The Dalles, Oregon: In Township one (1) North, Range eleven (11) East, the southeast quarter of Section thirty-two (32) and southwest quarter of Section thirty-three (33); in Township eleven (11) North, Range nine (9) East, that part of Sections one (1), twelve (12), thirteen (13), twenty-four (24), twenty-five (25), twenty-six (26) and thirty-five (35) south and east of the Metolius River, and all Section thirty-six (36); in Township ten (10) North, Range ten (10) East, that part of Sections two (2), three (3), eleven (11), twelve (12) and thirteen (13) south and west of said river, all Sections ten (10), fourteen (14), fifteen (15), twenty-two (22) to twenty-seven (27), both inclusive, thirty-four (34), thirty-five (35) and thirty-six (36); South and East, Willamette Meridian, Oregon. Nothing is hereby expressly given that no person will be permitted to gain or exercise any right whatever under any settlement or occupation begun prior to July 27, 1907, and all such settlement or occupation is hereby forbidden.
