HOPE LONG DEFERRED

Another hope has gone a-glimmering. It did look for awhile as though Harriman, spurred on by the danger of an invasion of this territory by other interests, was going to get busy on the extension of the Corvallis & Eastern railroad, and in the Bend country, especially, the extension of that road was looked to as the most hopeful prospect of relief from their transportation troubles.

With the adjacent woods full of Harriman surveyors, rushing work in the location of an easy grade across the mountains, it did look mightily like the fulfillment of an old dream—for the extension of the Corvallis & Eastern, with a crossing on the Deschutes at Pickett's Islands near where the town of Laidlaw is now located, was a dream of the early settlers of that locality.

But there is another rude awakening, and the dream of yesterday and today is still but a thing of shadow and fancy. Harriman has recalled his surveyors from the Corvallis & Eastern extension, with their work but half completed, and Central Oregon must again defer its hope for a railroad from that direction. A few Harriman bubbles have collapsed in Wall Street, and there is no money for railroad building.

Hope long deferred makes the heart grow sick, we are told, but Central Oregon has a strong heart and plenty of backbone, and just keeps a-hoping and a-pegging away. Without that hope that keeps the heart alive there would not be in Central Oregon today, in the face of such adverse conditions, great areas producing wheat for which there is no market, nor millions being spent in turning water onto desert wastes to convert them into prosperous agricultural districts, nor a hundred other great forces of development under way.

Cheap transportation means everything to a section like Central Oregon, and buoyed but by the bare and so far barren hope of it, it is truly remarkable what progress has been made. And what has been accomplished is but an index to what the future holds when the hope of rail transportation is realized, when the dream comes true.

Several years ago before the establishment of a village at Youngs, the road through the Stolker and Trotter places was the principal traveled highway for most of the travel to and from this place, that having been the old traveled road to this section. About the time the post office was established at Youngs the old road was closed, and since that time all the travel has come by Youngs and there has been considerable complaint by persons who traveled the road often. The old road to the gap will now be put in good repair, and fenced on both sides all the way through. It is already opened up and much of the travel is going that way.

THE COVE FRUIT EXHIBIT

This section of the county feels a pardonable pride in the splendid exhibit made by the Cove orchard at the Crook County fair, where Mr. Boeghl's display of fruit from his famous little Crooked River orchard was one of the attractive features. Regarding the fruit exhibit from the Cove and from other sections of the county, the Journal of last week says:

"The exhibits of fruit and vegetables, while not as large as last year, were remarkable for the different varieties shown. Nothing could beat the apple display for size, quality or flavor. Of course the largest individual exhibit was made by William Boeghl, proprietor of the famous Cove Orchard, who showed 45 varieties of Winter apples.

Among the many varieties exhibited were the celebrated

Banana Winter apple that Hood River sells for \$8 a box. Another variety that attracted a good deal of attention was called the "Wolf River." The apples measured 16 x 16 1-2 inches and were perfect specimens of their kind. We also noticed some fine specimens of Pound Pippins, Spitzenbergs, Golden Russets, Blue Pear-mains, Yellow Newton Pippins, Yellow Bellflowers, King of Tompkins County, Arkansas Blacks, Smith Cider, Northern Spy, Rome Beauty, Red Cheeked Pippin, Rhode Island Greening, Delaware Red, Winter Bellflowers and others. Apples alone did not form the exhibit. There were peaches, pears, plums, apricots, etc., English walnuts, hard and soft shell almonds, and lots of other things that time and space forbid to mention. The fruit display, mark you, does not represent any one particular section of Crook County, but all of it came from the Ochoco, from Powell Buttes, from Haystack, from Lamonta, from Gray Butte, representing a difference in altitude of at least 2000 feet.

Attorney W. W. Cotton, of the Harriman system, C. F. Adams, of the Security Trust & Savings Bank, W. D. Skinner, freight agent of the Harriman lines, W. B. Ayer, Portland capitalist, with Walter Witwer, chauffeur, made Burns in two days from Shaniko, via Prineville, arriving Monday night. Bro. Frank Davey wrested the secret of the trip from Granger Cotton: They were just looking at the country, "out for pleasure," but you cannot make Kennedy and Holder believe that's all.—Moro Observer.

Wholesale destruction of juniper trees in Crook county ought to be stopped in some manner. It has a commercial value which is only equalled by the finest quality of Coos Bay myrtle. In fact it commands \$150 per 1000 feet more at comb, brush and pencil factories, but it will all be burned in log heaps, we are afraid, before the advent of the railway.—Moro Observer.

NEW ROADWAY DEEDED TO THE PUBLIC

A right of way for a public road from the Fisher hill through the lands of John Trotter and Fred Stolker, to the Lyle & Brown gap has been secured, deeds from Stolker and Trotter to the public having been executed yesterday. This will make a great improvement in the road between this point and the railroad, by avoiding the pull around by Youngs, shortening the distance by a mile or more.
