Jack Church was in town the last of the week from Cross Keys, where he has been working on the new bridge which the county is building across Trout Creek at the Bolter place. The old bridge has been impassable for some time past, and the new bridge is being hurried to completion before the winter rains set in, as the creek is frequently too deep to cross at that season. Large pilings are being driven for the new bridge, which will be a substantial structure.

University of Oregon defeated the Multnomah Club in their annual game of football at Portland, on Thanksgiving Day, by the score of 10 to 5, repeating the victory of last year. These victories in the last two years' games are the only ones Oregon ever took from Multnomah on the gridiron. Among those who gained a special mention by their spectacular and brilliant playing in the Thanksgiving game at Portland was Martin Pratt, who formerly resided here and who was one of Multnomah's tackles.

BUY POWER SITE

Portland capitalists have purchased a power site on the Deschutes River, seven miles from Moro, from G. L. Bohr who owns Riverville. It is said that the towns of Wasco, Moro and Grass Valley, in Sherman county, are to be furnished with electricity for lighting and power purposes. At present all mills and small factories in Sherman county are using either wood or gasoline to operate with, and the cost has been enormous, and the new power company would bring about an era of great development for all of the towns in Sherman county. The power site is ideally located, as that portion of the Deschutes never freezes over, and the rise and fall in the river is very small.
